Would you like to save a life and be at the heart of your community? Become a community first responder

What is a community first responder

Community first responders (CFR) are volunteers with life-saving skills who attend medical emergencies where they live or work on behalf of the ambulance service. Because they volunteer in their community, they often can reach a patient before the arrival of an ambulance or response car.

Why do we need your help?

Every second counts when someone is in cardiac arrest. It is not always possible to get an ambulance to a patient in under eight minutes in remote parts of the East of England. However, immediate cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and early use of a defibrillator greatly increase the chances of survival. The East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust (EEAST) provides CFRs training to be able to save lives when someone's heart has stopped.

Who can become a CFR?

Anyone can become a CFR but you must:

- · be physically fit;
- be aged between 18-70;
- agree to a disclosure and barring service check (DBS);
- have a sympathetic, caring nature;
- agree to undertake training, which is provided by the service.

The first thing I taught her was the 'undo' button at the top of the screen. Not because I wanted her to feel she was always about to make a mistake, but in fact the opposite. I wanted her to feel the safety-net beneath her that would allow her to walk confidently on the tightrope of Information Technology – the knowledge that a mistake wouldn't be the end of the world.




Before the end of our 'course' she was creating the most incredible drawings in what was in those days a primitive version of Microsoft Paint – where you could only 'undo' the most recent click of the mouse. This was not a very forgiving undo button, to be sure, but nevertheless it freed her to find a new outlet for her artistic talent which inspired those of us around her.

Occasionally in life we get the urge to reach out for the undo button. The former England football coach Sam Allardyce must surely have been crying out inside for that elusive button when he realised he'd been caught in an undercover sting.

And if we're honest we've all been there, even if not so publicly. The desperate mental pleading for some 'deal' with God that will undo the hurtful words we said, the thoughtless selfishness of ignoring a friend in need, the fateful decision that caused harm to the ones we love most. If the clock could be turned back, we'd live our lives differently this time round....

The good news that we find in the Bible is that those mistakes that we make today have already been atoned for. The saving work of Jesus nailed to the cross for our sins has already been done – we've already been given the way out.



At Caldecote Church we've always wanted to be a church with an undo button – somewhere everyone can feel free of the fear of doing the wrong thing; somewhere that we can come as we are.

We are holding a bumper book sale in December when both adult and junior book sale items will be available at 20p an item. Do come along and have a browse and see if you can find yourself a bargain.

If you have babies or pre-school aged children in the family please do ask library staff about the Bookstart Bear Club. This is a scheme for young children to collect inky paw prints when they come along to Rhymetime or borrow books on their own library card. For every six paw prints they receive a certificate and there are ten certificates in total to collect. Do look at the board in the Children's Library area to see examples. We also have a second scheme called Bear's Reading Adventure which involves collecting stickers to complete a sticker book story. It takes ten stickers to complete, so is particularly suitable for pre-school children. You can choose for your young children to take part in either scheme, or both if you wish. Just ask for more information when you next visit the library.

Caldecote Primary School



As many of you will know, we had a long overdue visit from Ofsted early in September. Although we were prepared, it is still an anxious time – we had 3 new teachers who had only been with us for 6 days, our reception children had only been in school for 3 full days and children's work books had very little evidence in! We were all delighted with the outcome as the inspector confirmed that Caldecote School was a place where children say "learning is fun because we are allowed to explore, investigate and find things out for ourselves" and "all grown ups help us. We can try anything and it does not matter if we do not get it right. We have a go at all sorts of things and when we are stuck we get help and when we find it easy, we are helped to think about how to do it even better"

We are particularly pleased that the HMI inspector identified:

- Our unique curriculum that responds to the pupils' personal interests and experiences
- The parents who are incredibly positive about their children's experiences in the school
- That conduct around the school and in class is of a very high standard. Pupils are polite, kind and thoughtful to each other
- That children were insistent that bullying is rare and if there are any problems between pupils that cannot be sorted out between them, staff soon deal with them in a fair way

But the best bit of it all was "pupils were unanimous in their view that they were very happy at school. They said that they felt safe because the adults care about them and look after them well".

One of our pupils, Maddie Oliver, has been selected to be part of the cast so we are all very excited to see her performance and show our support.

Comberton Village College Sponsored walk

On 23 September Comberton Village College students clocked up more than 5000 miles between them in their annual four-mile walk to raise funds for projects undertaken in conjunction with partner schools across the globe.

Previously known as The Walk for Africa, 2016 saw the launch of "Walk for the World" as the Peruvian Lord Byron School in Arequipa will be receiving some of almost £3,500 donated so far. Comberton currently helps to fund specific projects in three orphanages in Peru and in the summer students helped decorate new accommodation for terminally-ill orphans there. Support will continue be given to long-standing partner schools Edendale in Pretoria and to Escola Secundaria Noroeste do 1 in Mozambique, schools which strive to offer educational opportunities to their young people in challenging circumstances.

This is the 20th anniversary year of Comberton's partnership with Edendale and funds from the walk this year will pay for specific work in the orphanage there.

Escola Secundaria Noreste do 1, in Mozambique is a mixed gender government school with over 6000 students but has very limited resources. It is very rare that students from the school travel within their own country let alone have the opportunity to visit another. Monies from the walk enable us to pay for Escola students to visit us every two years. This experience has been life-changing for the students and teachers involved and that influence is being more widely felt now within the school itself.

Trust chief executive Stephen Munday said: "We are really delighted that our schools take seriously the task of fund-raining for excellent causes. This is a proper and important part of education for young people in our schools. Being concerned about others and major issues in our world is something that we want for all young people we educate. Being prepared to do something positive about it, to make a difference, is to be highly commended."

Pennies for St Michael's - more pennies needed!!

Many thanks to all of you who brought pennies in for last Christmas! We had an amazing response and when we did our count in February we discovered we had indeed reached and exceeded our £2000 target. The total reached was indeed £2191.83! Which set us on a new target of £2500. If we can get there, this will be an incredible number of 250,000 pennies



raised for the ever on going repairs and restoration of the oldest building in the village. So far the pennies have been a big contribution to the new internal plasterwork and redecoration. It has made a big difference to the inside soundness and appearance of the Church so if you visit the Church this Christmas do admire the walls and decoration. Your pennies have been a big contribution to them.

We have now done another count. We have had quite a lot of small collections and recently I had the huge surprise of a very longstanding village family bringing me a trolley with a huge bag of pennies in it. This may well be a record collection. But all collections of any size are welcome. It takes 100 pennies to make £1 and 10,000 to make £100.

We currently have a team of five who do the counting and which we certainly need as the pennies are a huge volume and their weight is incredible! At the last count in October we totalled the great sum of £125, 16 – virtually all in 1ps and 2 PS!!! This brought our current total raised to £2316.99! (I'd have added in the last 1p to round it up if I'd known but it was a bit complicated after we'd finished and bagged everything up!!!)

The fantastic thing was that after this count, the next day two more good sized bags were delivered to me with quite a lot of 5ps in it – so please do keep collecting.

This means we just have to collect another £183.01 to reach our unbelievable target of £2500. I would love to think we could do it by this Christmas and the two new bags will go towards this. But obviously we need more. It will take 18,301 more pennies (or bigger coins!) to get there – but considering to raise £2316.99 has required collecting in 231,699 pennies so far it is absolutely possible with help from everyone who is, or might be willing to start collecting.

So please if you are collecting pennies or other small coins - do carry on. They can be in any type of container or polythene bag - whatever! If you can be persuaded to start collecting please do. Every single penny goes to the Village Church Restoration Fund so the pennies are very gratefully received.

I look forward to hearing. It will be fantastic if we can break/ even exceed the £2500 target!!!! Hopefully people will be generous over Christmas with a Christmas present of pennies! I will certainly put the new total in the next copy of the Journal.

Hopefully it will at least take us well on the way to that unbelievable magical £2500!

Dear Residents

For any people new to our village I thought you might like to know about our Pill Run as I call it. In conjunction with Bourn Surgery and our Village Hairdresser we organise a weekly Pill Run for people who find it difficult getting to the Surgery for medicines. Particularly regular prescriptions This was done recently by the late Mrs Watson but when she became poorly I took over.



It works like this: You take your prescription marking it Caldecote Box to the Hairdressers and put it in the red box. On Thursdays I collect the prescriptions and take them to the Surgery. They take them in and hand me the prescriptions I took in the week before I then bring them back to our lovely ladies in the shop and they keep them safe for you to collect a.s.a.p.

For Christmas and other public holidays timings may be different but I'll put a note up in the shop.

The Hairdressers does not have a fridge so I cannot bring back anything that needs to be kept cold.

Hopefully this service may be of some help to some people.

Heidi Allen MP Member of Parliament for South Cambridgeshire

1 So, Autumn is upon us and the return to Parliament has started with a bang. I'm keeping a close eye on some of the new legislation coming through as I believe there may be some great opportunities. Through the Digital Economy Bill I want to explore whether we can legislate for all TV companies to provide subtitles. Also, a universal broadband standard could be transformative for the constituency. The Neighbourhood Planning Bill could set mandatory levels of accessible housing in all new developments, something our disabled and elderly residents know is often in short supply. If you have ideas regarding any of the new legislation, please do keep them coming.

Of course, a busy week in Parliament is always matched by busier weekends in the constituency. I visited a number of fundraising events during the last of the summer sunshine - the Steeple Harvest Fair which I was delighted to open (and even better – judge the children's fancy dress and dog classes!), Guilden Morden Food Fayre and the Orchard Manor Summer Fete. All had a great turnout and I am thrilled to see Orchard Manor in Meldreth thriving under new owners, Aurora Care. I campaigned to keep this vital facility open and it's brilliant to see it growing.

I kept up my contact with local NHS organisations by meeting with the incoming Chair and Chief Executive of the CCG, and attending the 250th Anniversary celebration for Addenbrooke's Hospital. It didn't surprise me to hear that Addenbrooke's was the first hospital to deliver bedside examinations; they continue to provide outstanding care for our constituency and I'd like to take this opportunity to place my thanks on record for the outstanding service they provide.

On one particularly busy day, en route to Sawston Nursery to hear about the challenges of providing government funded childcare and Babraham CofE School (what a fantastic school!), I stopped by Reed Autos in Foxton who were hosting a 'Green Garage Event'. They're aiming to do their bit for the environment by providing courtesy electric cars and bicycles. Not only did they source an emergency tyre for me the very next day when I had a puncture, they have also just won the East of England Apprenticeships award for 2016. That's what I call a full service! Thanks and well done to Reeds Autos.

I also dropped into Gilead Sciences who are one of our bioscience pioneers in Granta Park, pioneering investigational drugs for cancer, HIV and hepatitis C. My inner science nerdiness really enjoyed hearing from such a passionate and forward focused team. South Cambridgeshire has an unrivalled reputation for bio-sciences and it's important we support them as we transition through Brexit.

I had an extremely positive meeting with Stephen Kelly, the new Joint director of Planning and Economic Development at South Cambs District Council. He is dedicated to improving the service of his department and is determined to make planning a fair and transformative system for all. The job isn't going to be easy but he is committed to delivering change and I support his initiatives to recruit more planners to his department which will give a better service to all.

You might have seen the new Constituency Boundary Proposals which came out in September. You can see what is suggested for South Cambridgeshire and have your say by visiting this website www.bce2018.org.uk I was bitterly disappointed to see suggestion that the Mordens, Bassingbourn and Melbourn be moved into a Hertfordshire constituency. If you feel as I do, please make your voice heard! They are part of South Cambridgeshire and always must be.

Heidi Allen Newsletter #13

This month, we're once again in unchartered waters, both nationally with regards to Brexit and also locally in terms of the City Deal. Whilst it's frustrating to ask people to be patient, in this fast paced, modern, Twitter dominated world it's easy to underestimate the value of scrutiny and consultation. We shouldn't. Taking time to consult, probe and examine what is being put forwards is the starting point for any successful negotiation and I remain confident that we have some sound navigators at the helm, being held to account by democracy in action.

I have been vocal about my opposition to the City Deal plan for Busway 3 and 3A (Cambourne to Cambridge route via the Westfields.) I sense the City Deal board are rushing because of spending deadlines imposed at deal inception, so I am working with the board and central Government to see whether we might be able to link the City Deal with the impending Cambridgeshire devolution deal. I believe a more creative and workable solution is possible which offers better value for money than the £140million partial route currently on the table. I'll make sure my voice is in the mix as these discussions move forwards.

The City Deal is just one of the ways I'm working with local and central government to improve things locally. My other big focus continues to be education. I'm not letting up on the fairer funding issue for our schools and met with Minister Nick Gibb recently to push for further action. I'm also championing a campaign to recruit more teachers into Cambridgeshire and have worked with the County Council and Anglia Ruskin University to host a Teacher Training Information Event. It will be held on 17th November, at 6pm at ARU and you can find more details on my website. If we have any budding teachers out there, this is your chance to find out how you can make a real difference to our children's futures. Watch out for a follow up Teacher Recruitment Fair in the Spring too. I'm also speaking to our planning department to see how we can provide key worker housing to attract the best and most talented teachers to our constituency.

I met more of our extraordinary talent this month when I visited the Technology Partnership in Melbourn, with the Prime Minister's new advisor on Industrial Policy. TTP flagged up a need to support British companies through sustained local growth that builds on R&D work, rather than outsourcing innovation to foreign suppliers. I'm proud of the work our local research is producing and will do everything I can to keep South Cambridgeshire as one of the brightest stars in the research, technology and science cluster.

The new Papworth Hospital found a unique way to celebrate their next phase of development as they invited me to 'Top Out' their new building on the Addenbrooke's campus. Having helped to level out a slab of concrete, a fir tree was swung over the building to ward away

bad luck. Apparently it's a tradition of the Norwegian contractor Skansa! The new site is extremely impressive with state of the art theatres, en suite bedrooms and world class research facilities. Another great local NHS success story.

I highlighted the importance of your contributions to the Boundary Review in my last newsletter but if you live in Bassingbourn, the Mordens, Melbourn or Queen Edith's and want to stay part of the South Cambridgeshire constituency, please make your voice heard on the consultation website - www.bce2018.org.uk. Every submission really matters, I don't want to lose you!

I was thrilled and humbled to be awarded 'Conservative Newcomer MP of the Year' by the Patchwork foundation. The award looked at the work my team and I have been doing to give a voice to under represented people, such as the disabled community. I only learn about those without a voice because you tell me – so please keep your emails, thoughts and feedback coming - I'm listening.
