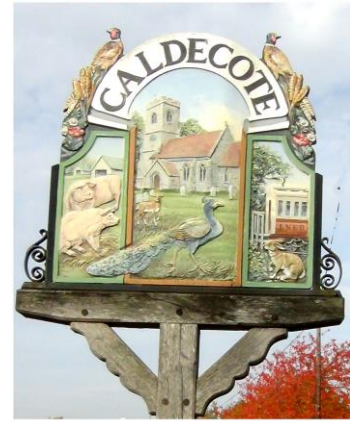

Planning for the future of Caldecote Church

We are incredibly grateful to Simon Gautrey our Treasurer, whose work over the past two years has given a clear picture of where we stand financially. The first year of his work saw us get on top of Gift Aid claims, up-to-date with expenses payments, and generally onto a good administrative footing.

His work enabled us in 2017 to see a full year played out clearly in our accounts and, for the first time, what we may have suspected before became very clear – we are running year on year at a deficit that is not sustainable. In order to be sustainable, Simon's estimate is that we need to increase our annual income on the daily running account by £7000 (c.£600 a month).

To continue to offer weddings, christenings, funerals, and simply a place for weekly worship and seasonal services at Christmas and Easter, we have come up with a plan...

Once you break the big total down into small chunks, it becomes much less daunting. Firstly, to ease the immediate cashflow pressures, funds raised by this year's Caldecote Open Gardens will go to the daily running account rather than the building restoration fund, which is a healthier state than our current expenses account. One way you can help is to participate in the Open Gardens, either as a visitor or a garden owner – see my article below for details.

But we would also appreciate your help on an ongoing basis, so that our parish church can continue its 900-year history. If just 20 or 30 of us donate small amounts like £2.50 a week, we will be well on the way to meeting our annual target to make the parish church sustainable for the future. Please take five minutes to read the enclosed booklet **'Planning for the future of Caldecote Church'** to understand more about the current financial situation, have your questions answered about how the church is funded and what the money goes on, and see the full plan for the future laid out. It also tells you how you can join those of us who are donating regularly in response to the plan.

A total of £1028 was raised for the church – and we cannot begin to thank those who worked so hard baking and serving and also to Daniel and Jo Lee on the plant stall and raffle while the rest of us relaxed with croquet, cake and cordials. District Councillor News & Update

Election 2018 Update

I am pleased to be back as District Councillor for the enlarged Caldecote Ward, with 58% of votes cast by Ward residents. Turn out was 45.49% which is good for a local elections.

History was made as the LibDems group now have control of South Cambridgeshire District Council for the first time in the history of the Council created in 1973. It has been run by the Conservatives since 1992. The two thirds majority of the last year was overturned by a two thirds LibDems majority this year, having won 30 of the 45 seats, reduced from 57 and new ward boundaries. Independents have 2 and Labour have 2 councillors.

Governance

By the time you get this news, the period of transition of control from the Conservative to the Liberal Democrat group will be complete. It is a new territory for everyone concerned but to keep things as smooth as possible, the new administration intends to continue implementing the policies already in place, much as it might be irksome. As long as we don't find a note saying there's no money left in the account, we should be ok!!

However, we will be making policy changes as appropriate, over the coming months and years, as we roll out LibDem policies. We cannot reverse the damage already done by the previous administrations policies, e.g delayed local plan, lack of 5-year housing land supply leading to speculative development blight, potential Bourn Airfield development etc. But we aim to limit the damage and try to move the district forward in a more positive direction, engaging and listening properly to our residents and taking your concerns seriously. So please bear with us as we find our feet.

Draft Local Plan & Bourn Airfield Development (BAD)- Update

We are still waiting for the Planning Inspector's pronouncement following submission of the last consultations responses back in March. We hope to bring this 4-year wait to a conclusion as soon as possible.

Superfast Broadband

I cannot repeat this enough, there is a Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) network in Caldecote. Let no-one tell you otherwise.

If you are having trouble getting superfast broadband from your supplier and cannot order because the "computer says no", or your order abandoned, or you are unsure if you can get superfast broadband, especially if you are with a non-BT supplier, first use the BT checker at <http://bit.ly/BTBroadbandChecker> to see if your address is registered on the BT system.

If it is showing your address as unable to order, then please contact me by email (tumi@tumihawkins.org.uk) and provide the following information: Your Name, house number, street name, postcode, tel number, supplier, order number (if any), reason for being refused an order, and any other comment that is relevant.

Its not a quick fix of a few days, could potentially be few weeks depending on the specific challenge with your address. But it is fixable.

Transport - The Cambourne to Cambridge (C2C) Busway

This one rumbles on slowly, although I think its been stuck in a jam for a while!

Transport in the Cambridgeshire area is now under the remit of the Mayor. He has pronounced that the Greater Cambridge Partnership cannot implement this busway without his say-so. He also wants his proposal for a metro system thoroughly examined first before a decision is made on bus or metro!.

Considering this busway project was being rushed through in order to convince the Planning Inspector that a transport strategy for Bourn Airfield development is viable, one wonders just what the Inspector will make of this latest fiasco.

Volunteer as a community first responder

Community first responders (CFRs) volunteer in groups, and are activated by the ambulance service to attend 999 emergency calls within the community they live or work.

They receive intensive training to help them provide vital basic lifesaving skills which can make the difference in a life or death situation before the arrival of an ambulance resource.

Volunteers take it in turn to be 'on call' and carry basic first aid equipment, oxygen and a simple-to-use automated external defibrillator (AED). The emergency operations centre sends them to the scene of category A (immediately life threatening) 999 calls.

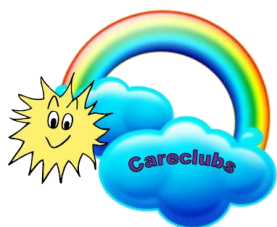
CFRs are dispatched at the same time as the ambulance crew, but often arrive beforehand because they are based so locally. The CFR then provides care until the ambulance arrives, usually only a few minutes later.

Anyone can become a community first responder but you must:

- be physically fit
- be aged between 18-70
- agree to a disclosure and barring service check (DBS)
- have a sympathetic, caring nature
- agree to undertake training, which we provide
- have a full driving licence and access to a road worthy car.

CALDECOTE, DRY DRAYTON & HARDWICK COMMUNITY CAR SCHEME



"If you need a lift for medical, dental or essential social purposes such as shopping, hairdressing, visiting relatives etc please ring one of the co-ordinators listed below. Please try to give at least 48 hours notice and only speak to or leave an answer phone message on one phone line as otherwise it could mean two drivers or more get booked for the same trip.

For emergencies (same day) please try all numbers but please say you have contacted other co-ordinators

(If no success with any of these - for emergencies ONLY - try Sheila Stephenson on 01954 210638. Please do not leave answerphone messages for emergencies except with Sheila.)

The above co-ordinators will link you with a driver who will come and pick you up at an agreed time, take you to your destination and deliver you home. All the drivers are volunteers and are only reimbursed for their petrol. Thus for each run to Comberton or Bourn the passenger pays the driver £3.50. For all other runs the passenger pays the driver 30p per mile of the journey. The mileage is calculated from the driver's front door to the destination and back again. Currently when the mileage is submitted to the County Council by our treasurer (roughly every six months) Cambridgeshire County Council reimburse the drivers an additional 15p per mile for the mileage they have driven. This is one of the reasons we need plenty of drivers so that the passenger can ideally be near to where the driver lives, thus cutting costs. All drivers are DBS (originally CRB) checked at no cost to themselves.

New drivers urgently needed.

Recently three of our drivers have had to stop driving for us due to health and personal reasons. We also regularly have drivers on holiday. Thus we do need to appeal now for more drivers to take their place. In the past we have had a good response especially from Hardwick drivers but we now need more as it is here we have currently lost them from.

What we also need now is a similar helpful response from drivers from Caldecote and Dry Drayton to keep driver's and passenger costs as low as possible.

The scheme can't exist without drivers! Also everyone helping with the scheme is a volunteer, usually with their own busy lives or work, and the more volunteers we have the easier it is to match up times of lifts and nearness of pick-up places.

So if you are a driver and have a little bit of spare time please do come forward. Passengers are always so grateful and your help makes things so much better for

everyone.

Time

A few months ago the grandmother clock, which sits in our hallway, stopped working. I managed to break something whilst winding it up one day and we had no clue how to fix it. It sat there reading 11.30 for months, until a very kind gentleman whom we know from the village came to have a look at it. He diagnosed a broken spring, went on the hunt to find a new one, and then proceeded to fit it for us - what a joy to have our clock chiming and going 'tick tock' once more.

The beautiful quarterly hour Westminster chimes are a delight, most of the time. Occasionally of course they stress me out as I realise that yet another 15 minutes has passed and so little has been accomplished.

I went to a training day recently all about Time Wisdom. It began with a critique of the whole field of Time Management. Merlin Mann, who was the pioneer of many time management techniques, came to realise that all they enabled was an illusion of control and a ceaseless drive for efficiency where 'more' gets done, but with little thought to priorities or purpose. And so he began to change his message to encourage people to focus more on vision and values; on what really matters.

The key point of the session was that there is never time to do everything, and that hard choices will have to be made. Only then can we begin to live lives that are less frenetic.

It seems this kind of message is crucial in our society. We cram more and more in, we long to be busy so as to appear important, and in all the rushing can miss the important things in life - taking joy in relationships and the little blessings of each day. Time is not made, but comes to us as a gift - a 'present' if you like double entendre. It is a gift from beyond ourselves, in Christian terms - from God. It is not a scarce resource, but the basic gift for living well.

Apparently Spring is here, so I hope you have been able to enjoy the few days of sunny weather that made an appearance in between the showers!

As many of you will be aware, the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) has been consulting on whether there should be a Park and Ride near junction 11 of the M11. Many Harston residents were concerned about the plans so last month, I attended the GCP's consultation event in Harston along with many residents, the Parish Council and local councillors.

The GCP tried to reassure everyone that the proposed P&R would not add to traffic congestion through Harston. Because there will be even greater growth on the Addenbrooke's biomedical campus the GCP understandably want to discourage M11 traffic from driving towards the City centre.

Since the meeting, I have spoken with local county councillors Kevin Cuffley and Roger Hickford and at length with the GCP's Chief Executive and Director of Transport. Although everyone recognises the enormous employment growth coming to the campus, I believe Harston residents need more data to be persuaded by the "no increased traffic through Harston" argument.

I was therefore extremely pleased by the GCP Executive Board's subsequent decision to request further analysis be undertaken and opinion sought before the project is brought back to committee for a decision. I will continue to work closely with the GCP, local councillors and the Mayor to ensure ALL options are looked at, and the best solution identified. We must find a solution that deals with City congestion, but not at the expense of our villages. If we can help Harston with their already well understood congestion at the same time, then even better.

South Cambridgeshire continues to play a leading role in all things Brexit. This was recognised recently when Parliament's Exiting the European Union Select Committee came to Cambridge to hear evidence from local stakeholders on the implications of Brexit for the science and research sector. I was pleased to be able to attend the session as the Committee has an important role in examining the UK's continued involvement in EU-wide agencies and collaborative projects, access to research funding post-Brexit, and potential changes to the general regulatory environment.

We have a wealth of experience on these topics and I am pleased that local stakeholders, such as Cambridge University, Astra Zeneca and Cancer Research UK were invited to participate.

Last month saw the consultation on the proposed closure of Cambridge Magistrates' Court come to an end. The proposal would see non-custodial work transferred to Cambridge County Court and custodial work transferred to either Huntingdon, Peterborough or, in some cases, Cambridge Crown Court.

I have been concerned about the lack of clear information surrounding the number of cases which would remain in Cambridge, how it would be decided which cases would be transferred out of Cambridge, the cost and appropriateness of using Cambridge County Court for Magistrates' Court work, and importantly, how the needs of the most vulnerable court users would be met.

The Ministry of Justice's plans lacked information about exactly what the closure of Cambridge Magistrates' Court might mean for my constituents so I wrote to the Ministry of Justice to seek more detailed information. Sadly, the information received has not diminished my concerns and I feel the consultation has been a missed opportunity to explain the plans with clarity.

These concerns were echoed at a meeting I had last month with our Police Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite so I hope the Ministry will rethink their plans.

The Government has also launched a call for evidence as part of its Cycle and Walking Investment Strategy safety review. The review

will look at how road safety can be improved for all road users as well as looking at ways to boost walking and cycling.

It's been another busy month, so I'll try and give you a flavour of what I've been up to!

On the 10th April, I was honoured to join the Prime Minister when she visited Addenbrooke's Hospital. Theresa May spoke to staff, learnt about our pioneering cancer research and treatment work and also launched a £75 million nationwide fund to improve research into innovative ways of combatting prostate cancer. I am so proud of the hard-working, dedicated commitment of our NHS staff and the Prime Minister's visit showed how important Addenbrooke's is, not only to us locally, but also at a national level. The Prime Minister was briefed on the hospital's wish to build a cancer hospital on the campus. This would both develop our world leading reputation for cancer diagnosis and treatment and also free up valuable space for more general hospital work. The Prime Minister grasped the potential of the proposals and I am pleased to report suggested I discuss the proposals in more detail with her special advisor. I'll keep you posted!

April also saw the Health Minister Lord O'Shaughnessy visit Royal Papworth Hospital. I invited him so he could hear from the world-leading experts there and see the innovative work that they undertake. Papworth are seeking sustainable funding for their DCD (donation after circulatory death) transplant programme – that's essentially the use of hearts which would not traditionally make the grade. Lord O'Shaughnessy left impressed and promised to follow up to see what might be possible.

And now for something completely different and less welcome!

In the last few weeks, we have seen a large number of travellers take up residence on land on the A505 at Thriplow. Although increased powers are now available to local authorities to deal with unauthorised caravan sites, the Government is reviewing the powers available and looking at what more needs to be done. Unauthorised encampments continue to be an issue locally and I hope that you can spare a few minutes to take part in the consultation -

Supporting local communities is an important part of my role in South Cambridgeshire and in the last month, I have been pleased to support a number of local events and campaigns, including prize giving at the Cambourne 10k



run (thank goodness they didn't make me do it, I'd be hopeless!) and meeting with residents in Stapleford who are campaigning to see The Tree public house turned into a community asset (I have more skill here!)

This month sees a new timetable for Great Northern trains and I know that many of you contributed to the train timetable consultation last year. The result is a new timetable from 20th May onwards which affects all Great Northern routes. Every train, from every station has been

changed with the intention of providing a more reliable service for passengers and increasing capacity. Details of the changes are available here - <https://www.railplan2020.com/>

Although I am pleased the operator listened to the majority of concerns raised by residents (and the original proposed timetable generated a lot!), there are still some services from Royston and Ashwell and Morden which require further attention. I will continue pushing for these amendments and will keep my website updated with progress.

Keeping with the theme of transport, I have been coordinating efforts with stakeholders to ensure a viable future for the Whippet X3 service which serves Cambourne, Papworth and the surrounding area. Working with Whippet, Royal Papworth, Astra Zeneca, Addenbrooke's, the County Council and Greater Cambridge Partnership, I am very hopeful that some kind of sustainable service to benefit everyone can be preserved. Again, I will keep you updated.

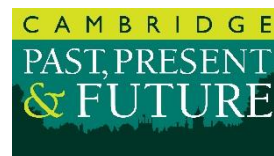
