COVID 19 Community Support

Self-Isolating Help

Self-isolation is when you do not leave your home because you have or might have coronavirus (COVID-19) to help stop the virus spreading to other people. Self-isolation is different to:

- <u>social distancing</u> general advice for everyone to avoid close contact with others
- <u>shielding</u> advice for people at high risk from coronavirus

It's a legal requirement to self-isolate if you test positive or are told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace. You could be fined if you do not self-isolate.

When to self-isolate

Self-isolate immediately if:

- you have any symptoms of coronavirus (a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste)
- you've tested positive for coronavirus this means you have coronavirus
- you live with someone who has symptoms or tested positive
- someone in your support bubble has symptoms or tested positive
- you're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or the NHS COVID-19 app
- you arrive in the UK from a country with a high coronavirus risk

How to self-isolate

You must not leave your home if you're self-isolating.

- do not go to work, school or public places
- do not go on public transport or use taxis
- do not go out to get food and medicine order it online or by phone, or contact the village support group for assistance (07394 946499)
- do not have visitors in your home, including friends and family except for people providing essential care
- do not go out to exercise exercise at home or in your garden, if you have one

When to get a test

Get a test as soon as possible if you have any symptoms of coronavirus. The test needs to be done in the first 8 days of having symptoms.

The symptoms are:

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste

You do not need to get a test if you have no symptoms or if you have different symptoms.

Tell people you've been in close contact with in the past 48 hours that you have /or may have symptoms

How long to self-isolate

If you have symptoms or have tested positive for coronavirus, you'll usually need to self-isolate for at least 10 days.

You'll usually need to self-isolate for 14 days if:

- someone you live with has symptoms or tested positive
- someone in your support bubble has symptoms or tested positive
- you've been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace

Help and support while you're self-isolating

Please let us know if you are self-isolating so that we can keep track of the effect of Covid-19 on the village, you don't have to give out any personal information and the notification is strictly private and for information only to help us gauge the requirements for the village.

Need help with food deliveries, medicine collection or anything else whilst self-isolating and our wonderful volunteers are here to help. Please do ask, don't suffer in silence.

Food Bank

Again, use the contact details above to either contact Nicola at the central email / tel no. or contact your area sub-coordinator. Absolute discretion and privacy will be maintained at all times. You will then be given a time and day for either a drop off if you are ill or isolating or a time and day if collection is possible. There will be a choice of available goods if you can collect.

£500 support for people told to isolate by NHS Test & Trace

The Government has created a new package to support and enforce self-isolation with payments of £500 for people who have been asked to isolate by NHS Test & Trace, which residents can apply for via an online form at www.scambs.gov.uk/coronavirus/self-isolation-payment/.

Residents who want to claim for a period of isolation prior to the form having been available (from 9 October) will be able to claim retrospectively if the period of self-isolation began on or after 28 September 2020. Payments will be made within three working days of submitting a fully completed application form.

People who are not eligible for this scheme should still contact us, as other support may be available to help them during self-isolation.

Caldecote Parish Council



The Parish Council continues to meet on the first Thursday of each month via ZOOM. Members of the public are quite welcome to join the meeting for the 15-minute open session at the beginning of the meeting, 7.00pm. The agenda and ID code and Password will be posted on the council's

website prior to the meeting.

The Parish Council have engaged SKK Design (Architects) to survey and suggest ways of extending the Pavilion and improving the facilities for sports, small meetings, and events.

Work will commence shortly on the upgrading of the security arrangements in and around the Pavilion, following advice from Cambridgeshire Constabulary. Improvements will include, CCTV and monitoring, enhanced security lighting to the building and the car park.

The Parish Council continues to monitor traffic and the impact the new construction of new developments in the village.

District Councillor News

COVID9 Update

The covid19 saga continues! Please continue to practice good handwashing, social distancing and wearing of face masks especially in shops and enclosed spaces where you cannot keep 2m distance. South Cambridgeshire numbers are rising but still low compared to national figures.

The council has asked local support groups to be prepared in case of a second spike. The Covid testing facility at Milton P&R is still open but hard to get appointment due to lack of testing kit. If you need a test within 24 hours, you will be sent to another facility outside the area.

If you are told to isolate by NHS Test & Trace, you could be eligible for £500 support during your isolation. Find out more at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/coronavirus/self-isolation-payment

Meeting with Anthony Browne MP

I and Parish Council representative from four of the Ward villages held a zoom meeting with the MP in August. We discussed a range of topic including superfast broadband provision, providing footpaths along B1046, speeding through villages, rural crime vis-à-vis response of the Police, hare-coursing, help to businesses that fell through the cracks of government support, the proposed changes to planning, East West rail and the requirement for more housing being in conflict with his assertion of reducing development, his response to the Black Lives Matter issue, support for the arts and Wysing Arts especially, future contact with parish councils. This opens a communication channel so that issues that might affect the community during the build out (up to 18 months) can be dealt with swiftly and effectively. Greater Cambridge Local Plan Update

The Planning Service recently published the outcome of the First Conversation consultation that took place in January 2020 and the sites submitted by landowners in call for sites last year. There are three in Caldecote. These sites have no planning status, they are a wish list only. The council will be engaging in a democratic process with local people to decide on the spatial strategy to use in the new plan, and only after that will any sites be selected. 
Advent Windows are Coming Back!

In this strange yeat of 2020 we are all used to the drill now with celebrations at a distance so it seems fitting that the Advent Windows are returning.




Village Togetherness over the Winter Months

As I write this article at the end of September, we are still working to our revised opening times, 10.00am until 2.00pm on Mondays and 2.00pm until 6.00pm on Wednesdays. The following outlines the service we are providing currently, but please do check the Library pages on the County Council website and the Library Service media platforms for any changes, as these will be publicised as soon as they are known. Although our current service is not what we are used to, Comberton Library staff still look forward to seeing you as you return and collect your books or use the IT facilities.

There is still no browsing of the shelves, and to maintain a safe environment for both our customers and staff we are operating a queueing system, as necessary, outside the library, to maintain social distancing. You can return books and collect items, which will have been issued already to your library card. Specific titles can be reserved online from home in the normal way, although reservations for picture books have been suspended. Our Select and Collect Request Service enables you to request a selection of books based on your preference. Staff will choose books based on the information provided and the stock available in the library. Please use the online form, available via www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/library to make your requests. If you do not have internet access, you can call Customer Services on 0345 045 5225, and the staff there will forward your request to the library. We will contact you to let you know when your items are available to collect.

Access to the IT facilities is available by appointment only, with a limit of one 45 minute appointment per day per customer. Again, this is to allow safe access and time for cleaning between customers. Printing and photocopying are available, but, as there is no cash handling, you will need change to drop into the photocopier coin box, 20p per page of A4 black and white and 75p per colour page. Printing costs are the same and can be paid for by dropping the change into the library's donation box.

PROJECT TO SAVE BOURN WINDMILL

Bourn Windmill, one of the oldest windmills in the UK, is at risk of collapse and the charity, Cambridge Past Present and Future are working hard to save it. It was purchased by the charity in 1936 and restored from a state of dereliction into working order.

The windmill dates from before 1636. It is an open trestle post mill which means that the whole mill rotates around a central pole. There are only around 50 of this type of extraordinary windmills remaining in the UK, 5 of which are in Cambridgeshire. Much of the mill's interior and workings are original with numerous names of past millers and their dates carved into the woodwork. In recognition of its heritage value to the nation, the windmill is designated as an Ancient Monument and is Grade I listed.

Graham Bruce is one of the charity's volunteers who helps maintain the mill and is also Chairman of the volunteer team. "During a routine inspection in 2020 we found evidence of rot in the cross beams. It is the beams that help support the weight of the mill and so this was concerning, and the charity contacted Historic England for help. They provided advice and an emergency grant to pay for a structural engineer and millwright to carry out investigative surveys. In June 2020, they started removing the bitumen that protects the woodwork to assess the extent of the rot. What they found surprised and concerned them, as Bill Griffiths, the millwright, describes as 'a sand and cement material, which we had imagined had been used only in a limited way as a filler for small defects was actually extensively distributed in the centre of all four crosstree arms. The wood surrounding this sand and cement showed rot in several placed and it appeared that rainwater was infiltrating the structure of the crosstree arms". The mortar was used for repairs in the 1980s when rot was discovered. These repairs are now over 35 years old.

The conclusion was a risk that the beam could fail, and the mill could collapse. It was considered that it was not safe enough to complete the investigative surveys and they have recommended that the mill is made safe by scaffolding/propping. This would also enable them to complete their surveys and assess the extent of the damage. It should then be possible to design a scheme of repairs to secure the future of the mill.

The mill is now closed until further notice, although it can still be viewed from nearby. The mill has been placed on the 'Heritage at Risk Register' by Historic England.

The cost of scaffolding and propping the mill for a year is around £12,000 and we need to do this as soon as possible but we also need to employ an experienced conservation architect and project team to assess the damage and design repairs. Only at that stage, will we know what the likely costs of repair might be. The total project costs are likely to be in the region of £50,000-£100,000, so the charity has launched a major fundraising appeal.

The charity was delighted to be awarded a grant of £23,250 by Historic England towards the £33,000 costs for the first investigative phase of the project. This will help pay for the scaffolding and propping up the mill and enable us to employ a project team to assess the damage and design a scheme of repairs. It will also provide employment for skilled conservation professionals during the Covid pandemic.


