Parish Council meetings are usually held on the first Thursday of each month, at 8pm in the Pavilion. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

**Co-option of a new Councillor:** Mr Gregor Jossaume has been co-opted as a Parish Councillor. Eighteen-year-old Gregor, a Politics student, has lived in Caldecote all his life and is especially interested in representing the youth aspect of the village. He will bring a much-needed young person's perspective to discussions on the Pavilion, parks and playgrounds.

**Volunteers Wanted:** It was decided that the Leisure and Amenities Working Group (L&A) will split their responsibilities into three separate working parties, all under the same umbrella. The first will deal with matters relating to the Pavilion and all sports pitches including the recreation ground, the Multi Use Game Area (MUGA), tennis courts and five a side pitch. The second group will deal with village open spaces, ditches and footpaths, while the third will concentrate on managing the projects to renew the playgrounds in Furlong Way and Greyway Close.

**Orchid Fare**: The site at Orchid Fare, where wild orchids used to grow in early summer, but have been extinct for many years, has been inspected by the School of History at Orchards East, who have said it looks an excellent spot for planting and managing a small community orchard. They will provide fruit trees free of charge, but volunteers will be needed to help plant and maintain the area. Please let us know what you think of the idea of planting a small community orchard on this site, and please contact the Clerk if you can offer your help with any of these groups. Other topics discussed include development of a village design statement, writing an emergency plan for the village, finance matters and correspondence received.

# Fire hits Highfields Road.

Around five thirty in the afternoon on Sunday 8 July while Nicola and Paul Pritchard with their son Thomas were enjoying the hot weather in their garden Paul spotted smoke coming from the roof of their home at 121 Highfields Road. Paul went inside to investigate. The smoke increased rapidly and spread along the street. Both their neighbours Jenny and David Phillips and Tim and Lorna Bates suddenly discovered that their gardens were full of a fog. They soon realised that it was smoke. Heading towards the source Tim and Jenny both shouted out what they could see. David phoned the fire brigade as did others who by now had seen the smoke. The neighbours immediately went to help. Meanwhile both Nicola and Paul were trying to rescue possession. With toxic smoke around the neighbours encouraged them to leave. Fortunately Tim was able to recover Paul's electric wheelchair from the front of the building.

Realising that the fire brigade would soon arrive David headed to the road to direct them to the fire. Within a few minutes the Leading Fire Officer arrived shortly followed by five appliances. Fortunately no one suffered any injuries although an ambulance did arrive later to check the Pritchards for any harmful effects of smoke inhalation.

The fire had started in the roof which by the time it was out had damaged it considerably, leaving the building uninhabitable. As a result Nicola, Paul and have been living in their caravan in the garden while their home waits to be repaired.

### **District Councillor News**

Please note that I provide a full report to the Parish Council at its monthly meeting, so please check out the meeting minutes or my blog for more details on the items discussed below.



# **Local Plan & Bourn Airfield Development (BAD)**

Finally, the Planning Inspectors selected by the Government to examine the 2014 Conservative Local Development Plan have passed the plan, subject to the main modifications which the Council submitted in February 2018.

This is not the Local Plan that would have been out forward had the Liberal Democrats been in power four years ago but even so the new administration now have to consider at the next Council meeting later this month, what is in the best interest of residents by either approving or rejecting the plan. A key consideration is that until very recently in May, there was no 5-year housing land supply which together with no Local Plan has meant a free for all for developers to build houses just about anywhere. In fact there are now 5000 houses with planning permission that are not in any local plan, with 202 of those in Highfields Caldecote!!

Key housing sites in the two Local Plans (for Cambridge and South Cambs) that have been found sound by the Inspectors are below. Only a proportion of the homes at the larger sites would be built by 2031:

A new town north of Waterbeach – approximately 8,000-9,000 homes

A new village at Bourn Airfield – approximately 3,500 homes

An expansion to Cambourne to the west – since the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan was submitted planning permission has been granted for 2,350 homes

Homes on land north of Cherry Hinton and west of Teversham - 1,200 homes

Around 900 homes in the better served South Cambridgeshire villages

Continue to develop Northstowe – around 10,000 homes

Continue to build homes in existing growth sites on the edge of Cambridge (Southern Fringe, Cambridge East, Darwin Green and Eddington)

Worts Causeway - 430 homes

Extension to Cambridge Biomedical Campus to support the growth of this cluster Extension to the Peterhouse Technology Park on Fulbourn Road

Other key policies in the plans and findings of the Inspectors include a commitment to an early review of the Local Plans to start in 2019 to be submitted for examination in 2022. This was already a commitment of both Councils as part of signing up to the City Deal agreement.

For South Cambridgeshire, the Inspectors confirm that the plan makes adequate provision for Gypsies and Travellers who have been identified as meeting the current government planning definition. Further consideration will be given as part of the Local Plan review on the needs of Gypsies and Travellers who no longer travel.

With regard to **Bourn Airfield new village**, the Inspectors report seems to gloss over the main objections to the proposal, stating "there is a reasonable prospect that a satisfactory form of development can be achieved through a design led approach which may include residential densities higher than those in some of the existing villages. It is not intended that the Bourn Airfield development will be created as a wholly self-contained settlement."

The Inspectors conclude that "We are mindful of the significant levels of opposition to the Bourn Airfield proposal expressed by the local community and others, including fears of coalescence and traffic implications, including local traffic management issues relating to the Broadway. There is a degree of scepticism from the local community about whether their concerns can be adequately addressed. But there is nothing to indicate that these concerns cannot be satisfactorily addressed through the development management process and further guidance provided by SPD".

So there you have it. Whatever happened to localism and local people having a say? Planning Inspectors have a lot to answer for in regard to what will be happening to Caldecote going forward. # Transport - The Cambourne to Cambridge (C2C) Busway

It is on record that Mayor James Palmer is not in favour of the busway and two months ago instructed the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) to "pause" work on the proposal until the study into his transport proposals for the combined authority area is completed. Therefore, no progress has been made yet on selecting the preferred route.

The Planning Inspectors in the local plan report stated "It is fair to say that the scheme is still at an early phase of development, but the City Deal Executive Board allocated £59 million towards the eastern section of the scheme in January 2015, and we consider that there is a reasonable prospect that the scheme will be completed during the Plan period."

It is clear they did not consider the Mayor's role and that their confidence in its completion within the plan period may be misplaced.

# A428 Dualling Plans delayed.

It is very disappointing to learn that the dualling of the A428 has been put back by at least a year. This work was to start as the A14 upgrade completed in 2020 but is now due to be completed sometime between 2020 and 2025. The preferred route announcement is still scheduled for 2018.

## **East West Rail**

CamBedRailRoad (CBRR) is a community based group that is promoting an alternative route for the 'missing link' on the Cambridge to Oxford railway. The section between Sandy and Cambridge has not yet been planned – and an announcement is expected very shortly. CBRR consider that the current preferred route corridor is inadequate and are actively promoting an option running along the A428 corridor connecting the new developments at Bedford, St Neots, Cambourne and Northstowe before dropping into the new station at Cambridge North. # **Recycling and Single Use Plastics**

Councillors have supported a motion to look at ways in which the Council can reduce its own use of single use plastics and encourage residents to do likewise. It is extremely difficult to avoid single use packaging and it must be up to Government to legislate to get the supermarkets to move from their over-reliance on plastic. Iceland and Morrisons have made a start so hopefully others will follow but we can all do our own little bit. As a start you can

avoid buying anything that is in black plastic which cannot even be recycled and will end up in landfill.

# "Caldecote, Dry Drayton and Hardwick Community Car Scheme

Firstly we have some excellent news. Our computer system is really starting to work and cover our needs although all the co-ordinators say firmly their diary is their first means of recording their journey requests. However what the system has just shown up, is that in the last five months, as a team, we have carried out 483 separate journeys and covered 6,071 miles. We knew we had been busy and needed all our drivers – especially with all the holidays – but it really does show how much a big team is needed.

Because we were all feeling the demand, and as always resolve not to let any one of our passengers down, we have expanded our number of co-ordinators. Now there are five people to ring for lifts instead of our original four. Please see the details below. Graham Cowell is our new recruit and we are very grateful to him for not only driving but also taking on Co-ordinating too. Thus if you need a lift for medical, dental or essential social purposes such as shopping, hairdressing, visiting relatives etc do please ring one of the co-ordinators listed below. Please try to give 48 hours notice if possible and only leave an answerphone message on one phone line as otherwise it confuses co-ordinators and might mean two lifts or more get booked.

### Note to passengers

The above co-ordinators will link you with a driver who will come and pick you up at an agreed time, take you to your destination and deliver you home. All the drivers are volunteers and are only reimbursed for their petrol. Thus for each run to Comberton or Bourn the passenger pays the driver £3.50. For all other runs the passenger pays the driver 30p per mile of the journey. The mileage is calculated from the driver's front door to the destination and back again. Currently when the mileage is submitted to the County Council by our treasurer (roughly every six months) Cambridgeshire County Council reimburse the drivers an additional 15p per mile for the mileage they have driven. This is one of the reasons we

need plenty of drivers so that the passenger can ideally be near to where the driver lives, thus cutting costs. All drivers are DBS (originally CRB) checked at no cost to themselves.

# Note (1) to Drivers

# New drivers are urgently needed.

Recently a few of our drivers have had to stop driving for us due to health and personal reasons. We also regularly have drivers on holiday. Thus we do need to appeal now for more drivers to take their place. In the past we have had a good response especially from Hardwick drivers, but we now need more.

What we also need now especially is a similar helpful response from drivers from Caldecote and Dry Drayton to keep driver's and passenger costs as low as possible.

The scheme can't exist without volunteer drivers! Also everyone helping with the scheme is a volunteer, usually with their own busy lives or work, and the more volunteers we have the easier it is to match up times of lifts and nearness of pick- up places. Currently, as said, we are very short of drivers in Caldecote and Dry Drayton. If anyone in those villages can help in any way we would be particularly grateful.

So if you are a driver and have a little bit of spare time please do come forward. Passengers are always so grateful and your help makes things so much better for everyone.

This really would be appreciated particularly if you are away over a week. Also if you can, please leave a suitable safe message on your ansaphone. Many thanks for your help with this.

# Help

In 1965 John Lennon wrote a Beatles hit entitled 'Help!' Apparently, following their meteoric rise, Lennon wrote the song to express the stress he was feeling; underneath a calm exterior was a cry for help. I'm sure most of us can identify with that feeling - the mask stays on but underneath, the face has cracked, and we are longing for help.

Oddly though, it is one of the hardest things to ask for. It means admitting that everything is not quite okay, accepting that independence and autonomy are bizarre ideals that simply cannot bear much semblance to reality. But often we'd rather struggle on, pretend we can cope on our own, than learn genuine interdependence.

Some, of course, are better at asking for help than others. I had a friend at University who seemed to excel at it. No embarrassment; just a calm confidence that enabled her to go to CBT, to ask for essay help, to crash out with friends when needed. Looking back, there was a lot I could have learnt from her.

Asking for help is something I'm still learning; I'm realising I can't do it all, however fast I pedal, and more importantly that asking for help is a good thing. Unfortunately, some narratives we live with, including some Christian ones, make asking for help quite difficult. There is an old prayer that goes like this:

'Jesus has no hands but yours // no feet but yours // no body but yours with which to touch the world...'

It has, in my view, had rather pernicious consequences. It perpetuates the lie that 'I' must run myself ragged and do all I can because there is no one else. It can lead to a rather arrogant form of Christianity which says 'I' have the resources, and 'you' have the need. Instead, I'm beginning to learn that Jesus is more often found ahead of us, working through the hands and feet of others - even if they don't know it; I'm learning that to cry 'help' might actually be the entrance into a far richer life.

# Heidi Allen

# Member of Parliament for South Cambridgeshire

There's been no shortage of sun this summer so I hope you have been able to spend some time enjoying the glorious weather!

Parliamentary recess allows me to focus on important local issues while I am away from the "hurly burly" of Westminster. As always, my newsletter can only ever be a snapshot of my work but I hope it gives you an overview of what I have been up to!

The major infrastructure improvements needed in South Cambridgeshire remain a priority for me. In July, Highways England announced their plans to start construction work on the expressway between the Black Cat roundabout and Caxton Gibbet in 2021/2. This is later than originally planned and I share residents' concerns about the delays. Highways England told me there are two reasons. The engineering at the A1 end is more complex than originally envisaged and they also want the A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon works to complete before they begin construction work on the A428.

I am meeting with the Chancellor (along with neighbouring MP, Jonathan Djanogly) soon to ensure he fully understands how vital this road improvement scheme is and that nothing can allow it to be delayed further.

Another much-needed improvement to our local infrastructure is the Girton M11/J14 Interchange. If improvements are not made, the benefits of the A428 expressway and the improvements to the A14 simply won't be delivered as we won't have a joined-up network. With the housing growth anticipated across Cambridgeshire and with new jobs being created at the Biomedical Campus, we need to make sure the growth potential of the area has the infrastructure to match the ambition for the area. I have made a bid for funding for the Girton interchange ahead of the Autumn Statement and reiterated how vital it is to the Chancellor and Roads Minister.

East West Rail (Oxford to Cambridge) is another project that many constituents have contacted me about and I want to reassure you that NO route has yet been chosen. Personally, I support a route that is closely aligned with the A428 corridor as public transport is almost non-existent in this part of the constituency. It would also support the housing growth planned at Cambourne and Northstowe, so seems obvious to me. I am pushing this route with Rob Brighouse (Chairman of the East West Rail Company) and am pleased to report he has shown interest and we will be meeting again soon. I'll keep you posted, but please be assured I will let you know as soon as any route possibilities emerge.

In my newsletters at the beginning of the year, I urged local residents to contribute to the consultation on the Ministry of Justice's proposed closure of Cambridge Magistrates' Court. Well, you did and they listened! At the end of July, the Ministry confirmed the court will remain open. Thank you to the many local people who contacted me about this – there were a number of concerns about the consultation and I am pleased that the right decision has

been made. We made this happen!

Over the summer I've been out on the farm, helping with the harvest in Thriplow and Boxworth. I suspect I may have been more hindrance than help but I was very enthusiastic! A combine harvester may not be everyone's vehicle of choice, but I thoroughly enjoyed it!

Our farmers of course work hard all year round, but there is an undeniable pressure at a harvest time as they work around the clock to bring our food in off the fields. Hats (caps?) off!

In August, I spent a shift with the Cambridgeshire Fire

and Rescue Service. I donned my boots, braces and trousers as I got to grips with just some of the work our fire service do for us. As you'd appreciate, they do an amazing job in often

very difficult situations, but having participated in a training exercise in a smoke filled building, I cannot commend them highly enough. It never occurred to me that when a building is on fire, they work with no visibility – zero. I couldn't see a thing. Speaking honestly, I was terrified. So I'd just like to put on record my personal thanks.

You will be aware from my previous newsletters of the action I have been taking to hold GTR to account for the debacle following the introduction of their new train timetable in May. Over recent months, I have been arguing that compensation must not apply only to season ticket holders – there are plenty of commuters in South Cambridgeshire who have been affected but who are not season ticket holders.

In the last few days, GTR has announced that the compensation scheme will now also include non-season ticket holders. This is welcome news but GTR still have some way to go to ensure that services are better and I have contacted Chris Grayling again to urge him to delay the proposed rail fare increase until the services have been fully restored AND maintained. My work on behalf of commuters continues and I will be meeting with the new Chief Executive of GTR shortly. I will leave him in no doubt about the strength of feeling of local commuters and will provide an update on this on my dedicated website page – www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/qtr and in my next newsletter.

Until then, if there is anything you would like to talk to me about, my next no appointment "drop in" surgery will be on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> October (10.30am -12.30pm) in Northstowe. 
