Caldecote Dry Drayton and Hardwick Community Car Scheme

Now that we are in lockdown yet again, some of our drivers are unable to take part for the moment. While this leaves us short on numbers, those that remain are being incredible at keeping the scheme going - and so far no-one has been let down.

In this lockdown the scheme is strictly for essential runs only and strict hygiene/sanitising must be kept, masks must be worn and all the basic rules of distancing etc must be kept as far as is possible.

Another factor that comes into this is that people are now being invited for their Covid jabs. It seems that our Primary Care centre is currently at Royston unless your invitation says something different. We will still cover these runs if we have the drivers and the cost will be calculated at 30p per mile from the drivers front door to the destination and back again. The cost will be somewhere around £10+ to Royston and back.

Coronavirus vaccine scam warning

Watch out for fraudulent text messages from scammers posing as the NHS, claiming to offer Coronavirus vaccines.

A recent scam has seen residents being sent a text message which includes a blue link, which takes them to a fake webpage with NHS branding. The resident is then asked to 'confirm ownership of address' by providing their bank details.

Scammers claiming to be from the NHS are also telephoning residents, instructing them to press a key to confirm they'd like to receive the vaccine or asking for bank details as affirmation to receive the vaccine. Many now claim to offer 'VIP' vaccination tickets that will allegedly put you at the head of the queue – for a price!

Please remember that your GP surgery or the NHS will administer your Covid vaccine free of charge. Do not give out your bank details to pay for a vaccine or to confirm your address.

Caldecote Parish Council



On behalf of the Parish Council, I wish you all a happy and healthy New Year.

This has been a remarkably busy period for the Council, we continue to monitor the current Covid-19 emergency, the second wave is more transmissible than the original wave in the spring of 2020. The members of the Council are particularly grateful for the work carried out by Councillor Nicola Pritchard and her colleagues for the way that they are providing community support. We hope that parishioners, particularly those in vulnerable groups can feel that support such as food provision, collection of prescriptions and transport, is of benefit.

Work to replace the play equipment in Furlong Way is progressing and should be completed shortly, there has been some delay because of the inclement weather. This is another phase in our programme to upgrade and maintain play equipment in the village.

The Parish Council are currently negotiating with Architects for the extension of the Sports Pavilion in Furlong Way. The current building falls short of the needs for a growing sports community, plans include extending the current meeting room and utilising the wasted space on the second floor, which is currently un-accessible. The efficiency of the building is also to be upgraded. The current heating system is wasteful and does not meet modern standards. There is also a problem with the lack of sustainable insulation. The Council are considering alternative sources of energy including ground source and solar.

The Parish Council has recently set its budget for the forthcoming financial year. The Council have set a budget which will see a small increase in the Parish Precept to £83,838, this is an increase of £1,237.78 or £1.56 per annum for a Band D property.

The Council is concerned about flooding issues and is engaging with all the relevant authorities to control any major issues.

The Council still monitors the work on the two major developments in the Villages and is in regular contact with the developers and South Cambridgeshire District Council.

In the meantime, because of lockdown, meetings are being held by Zoom, details will always be posted on our website.



Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough have been delivering these schemes for 27 years and with the funding support from South Cambridgeshire District Council we are pleased to be in a position to expand the scheme to those living within the above mentioned villages.

I have worked in the health and social care sector in the local area for 22 years and have extensive experience and knowledge of supporting older people in the community.

The Community warden service assists adults over 60 to continue to live independently and safely at home by providing daily contact (Monday to Friday) and support by a personal visit (COVID19 compliant) or a telephone call to ensure a sense of security and wellbeing. We can help you on a long or short term basis depending on your needs and wishes. An example of some of the things I can do to help you are;



- Collecting prescriptions
- Reading post and making phone calls on your behalf
- Spend time with you to have a chat
- Listen to any concerns and help you find a solution

You will receive a 2 week **FREE** trial and after that we ask for a small charge of £9 per week for a single person and £11 per week for a couple. Below are some quotes from people that use our service.

"That phone call every day to check on me gives me such a great deal of security. You can't believe what a phone call can mean at my age"

It is with a heavy heart that we have to announce the sad news that John Newby has passed away.



John Newby 21st April 1934 – 23rd January 2021 (86 years)

John was born and raised in Leeds and attended Roundhay Grammar School followed by Leeds University to read Agricultural Botany. In 1956 he started National Service in the REME where he signed extra years to do officer training and became a Second Lieutenant based in Cyprus.

After the Army in 1959 he started a long career in the agricultural seeds industry by joining Webbs Seeds in Stourbridge. In 1962 he and the family made the move to Willingham and Cambridge when he joined the National Institute of Agricultural Botany, (NIAB), in seed production.

Services, which acted as a consultancy to the seeds industry namely ICI Seeds and CPB Twyford at Thriplow. He retired in 2009 after 50 years in the seeds industry.

Married to Joyce (1959-2000), who he met at university, John had 2 sons Michael and Andrew. He was passionate about all things agriculture, gardening and the countryside especially Yorkshire. He loved his cars and driving especially for his job which involved a lot of farm visits throughout the country and had many farmer friends.

John moved to Highfields Caldecote in 2001 where he lived with his partner Christine Baker until she died in 2012, and then on his own. He was proud of his grandchildren, Tom, Grace and Tanith (Christine's granddaughter) and always supported them.

He was very active in the village spending some years on the Parish Council and particularly liked his work on the sports fields.

A perfectionist by nature, John probably only achieved a portion of the things he planned to do but what he did achieve was done to the highest standards!

Caldecote Parish Council are very grateful for all the work John has contributed to the village and greatly saddened by his death. John served on the Parish Council for many years and was very actively involved in the village. The sports field and peace garden were two of his passions and he was a great font of knowledge regarding trees and maintenance of the grounds.

Bourn Surgery – January News

How Bourn Surgery is responding to the move to Level 5 emergency response and new national lockdown:

Moving to Level 5 emergency response means that all non-essential general practice work should be stopped to allow general practice to cope with very significant, potentially overwhelming, demand relating to COVID-19, acute deterioration in long-term conditions, new symptoms indicating potentially serious disease and the COVID-19 vaccination roll out. We have spent time in the last week working out what this means for Bourn Surgery. The major message we want to communicate is that we are open. We have remained open and here throughout the pandemic and previous two lockdowns, and will continue to be here during this next stage of the pandemic. We have maintained our normal level of appointments throughout, and will continue to see patients face-to-face when clinically needed. If you need us, we are here.

We do however need to ensure that we are able to protect our vulnerable patients who need to see us in person at the Surgery, by providing an environment that is as safe as possible. We also need to protect our staff from any unnecessary contact to reduce the risk of the nightmare scenario, which has happened in a number of practices, of having so many staff off sick and isolating that the practice has to close. We are open and we are here, but we must act to protect our communities and our patients.

The current important points are:

- All GP appointments will continue to be by telephone/video in the first instance. Only after this initial appointment can a decision be made about whether a face-to-face contact is required.
- No-one is to enter the practice building unless they have a pre-arranged face-to-face appointment. If you need to speak to Reception to book an appointment or update us, please do this by telephone.
- Dispensary are now handing out medications from the side window into the car park. We have an awning to ensure you have shelter from inclement weather and are fixing the lighting to make sure that visibility is good in the evenings. We have used cones to create a safe space within the car park for this.
- Due to the impact of needing to deliver the COVID-19 vaccination programme at pace (see more below), no appointments will be available to book more than 7 days in advance. This is to ensure that we do not have large volumes of appointments to rearrange when we are informed of our vaccine delivery dates and need to release doctors and nurses to the vaccine centre.
- We will continue to work proactively to reach out to our patients who have more complex medical needs, to ensure that we continue to monitor and safely manage their health conditions throughout this pandemic.

We discussed the results of a survey we have carried out asking patients about their experiences of telephone and video appointments with the PPG. We reflected that, once the pandemic has passed, for certain groups of patients telephone and video consultations can be a much more convenient and accessible way of engaging with us, and we are keen to ensure that we build on the technological advances that the pandemic has necessitated. This is a unique and challenging situation for us all, and so far 2021 is not proving any easier than 2020. We will continue to review, revise and revisit the way that we are responding to the pandemic, and we are grateful for your support as we do so.

COVID-19 Vaccination update:

Finally, we are able to share some news with you! The communications given out around the vaccine programme are tightly controlled by NHS England, and up until this week we have been asked to simply say "you will be contacted when a vaccine is available for you". Thankfully, that has now changed.

Locally the Pfizer vaccine began to be delivered at the end of December by local hospital hubs. Due to the complexity of the Pfizer vaccine, its cold-chain requirements and very short shelf-life, sites have to be able to give 1,000 doses within 3 days. This is clearly very challenging, especially for small rural GP surgeries such as ours.

At the current time it is not possible for individual GP practices to deliver either the Pfizer or Astra Zeneca vaccine from their own premises to their own patients. This is a nation-wide directive. Instead, GP practices are working together in groups (otherwise known as Primary Care Networks) of 45-50,000 patients to deliver the vaccine from one single site within that grouping, for all patients of the group of practices. We are pleased to announce our local vaccination hub in Royston started vaccinating patients from Mon 18th January.

The vaccine priority groups (i.e. who gets called for a vaccine when) have been decided centrally by NHS England. We have absolutely no ability to alter to this or make exceptions. The first groups to be vaccinated are care home residents and staff, health and social care workers and social care workers, and the over 80s. As each cohort is completed, we can then begin calling those in the next priority group. We are not allowed to offer a choice of vaccine. Again, this is a national mandate. Our priority has to be to ensure that no vaccine is wasted, and that every dose is given to an eligible patient.

We do know that automated booking systems will be used to help deal with the huge administrative burden of booking hundreds of vaccine appointments in an extremely tight timescale. Those with mobile phone numbers on their records will be contacted by text initially, therefore if we do not have a record of your current mobile number, please ensure you update us with your mobile number. As soon as we are able to book appointments for those in the first priority group, you will be contacted. Please DO NOT contact Reception about this until you are invited to do so.

If you have received an invitation letter from the NHS, you also have the option to contact the phone number and arrange vaccination at one of the mass vaccination centres such as the Grafton Centre or Stevenage.

We know that this has been a very frustrating time for you all, and the lack of information has been questioned by some. As we are sure you can imagine, we are desperate to get going with this work. This will inevitably have an impact on staffing levels at the Surgery over the next months, as clinicians and admin staff are needed to staff the vaccine centre whenever we are in receipt of vaccine delivery. We will do our very best to ensure that we strike a balance between continuing to provide care from our Surgery, and playing our part in the vital national vaccination effort.

Thank you very much for reading this (rather long!) update, but we hope it is useful to help you have a better understanding of this difficult and complex situation that we find ourselves in.

District Councillor News

COVID9 Update

South Cambs district was in Tier 4 from 26 December and moved into national lockdown No.3 from 5 January. The Covid19 variants transmits fast which means we must all be extremely careful. 1 in 3 people who are infected have no symptoms. Avoid spreading it so **Stay Home** unless it is an essential journey. No household mingling, exercise allowed once a day locally and you can meet only with one other person outside your house. Full details on government website at

https://www.gov.uk/guidance/national-lockdown-stay-at-home

The **South Cambs** offices are still closed and staff are working from home. The Council provides up to date information and guidance on covid-related services it provides at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/coronavirus/.. Businesses affected since December can apply for financial help. Check criteria and forms at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/business-coronavirus.

The vaccination programme is well underway. People aged 80 and over still waiting for their vaccination have no cause to worry about being forgotten. If they are registered with a local GP, they will be contacted to invite them to book a vaccination appointment. Do not contact the NHS or phone Bourn or Comberton surgery. If you are not registered with a local GP, please do so quickly to ensure you receive an invitation.

Next group to be vaccinated will be people who are 70+ or clinically extremely vulnerable.

Covid Support for Education

South Cambs council has made available £30,000 in funding to help people, especially children to get online. It is in addition to the Government's winter support grant scheme. The charity Cambridge Online is running this on our behalf. Green Homes Grant scheme

Government funding to make homes more energy efficient to help you saving money on household bills. The scheme closes on 31 March 2021. It could be worth up to two thirds to full cost of improvements, from £5000 to £10,000 depending on your circumstances. Covid Isolation Centre

The Hotel at Bar Hill is being used by the Government to isolate truck drivers who have tested positive for Covid19. They are sent directly from the Peterborough testing centre. They are not allowed out of the hotel and food/essentials provided for them.

Community Warden Scheme

The Council launched 7 new Community Warden Schemes (CWS) and one of them covers the villages of **Bourn, Caldecote**, Comberton, Hardwick, Toft, Papworth and Wimpole. It is being run by Age UK. The scheme helps those above 60 who prefer to remain living independently in their homes to do so safely, happily and not feel isolated. Local Planning Issues:

Bourn Quarter – Former TKA Tallent Site 20/02568/FUL was granted planning permission at the January Planning Committee.

Bourn Airfield New Village - S/3440/18/OL – The outline planning application will be going to planning committee on Friday 19th February 2021.

Proposed Solar Farm at Childerley

An energy firm is proposing to build a 60GWh solar farm on land north of Childerley Hall. If built, it is estimated it could power up to 18000 homes. It still has to go through planning, but the company will be consulting neighbouring communities directly shortly. Check their website at https://www.solarcentury.com/stargoose/

Caldecote Community Liaison Group

This was set up by the District Council bringing the district council, parish council and developers together to discuss how the developments are moving forward, raise issues and work out solutions to minimize impact of the builds on the local community. The first meeting was held on 8th October 2020, and the second meeting on 20th January 2021. Linden Homes did not attend, but 3 Balfour Beatty representatives attended.

Spring Time

Spring is usually said to start at the beginning of March and the 21st of March is the Spring Equinox; the date on which day and night are of equal length. This season is a time of days getting longer and the spring sunshine brings growth and greenery. Birdsong reaches a peak and many flowers appear, in turn attracting insects including bees and butterflies.



Last March in the first lockdown everyone was commenting on how loud the birds were singing. Of course, the bird's songs hadn't changed, it was just that we were still and were able to better notice and listen to them. After what has been a very long and difficult year, and a wet and miserable winter, we can soon look forward again to the delights of the dawn chorus.

From March to July, our feathered alarm clocks are at it again, as they defend their territories and sing to attract a mate. As winter turns to spring, the lengthening daylight switches male songbirds into breeding mode.

The first songsters of the season are residents such as robins and great tits, joined later on by migrants like chiffchaffs and blackcaps to make May and June the peak time to enjoy the dawn chorus.

The early bird catches the worm

The first birds begin to sing about an hour before sunrise. Among the earliest to rise are skylarks, song thrushes, robins and blackbirds, and as they do eat worms there may be some truth to the old saying!

A more relaxed approach is taken by wrens and warblers, that typically appear later. These smaller birds, perhaps more sensitive to the coldness of dawn, feed on insects that themselves appear later in the morning.



Why the dawn chorus?

The dim light of dawn is not a good time to go foraging. Food, like insects and seeds, may be difficult to find, so perhaps it's a better time to try and attract a mate. Singing also brings the risk of attracting a predator, so it is better done before the bright morning light betrays the singer's position.

The air is often still at this time and, with less background noise, song can carry up to 20 times as far. As the light strengthens food becomes easier to find, so hungry birds begin to move off and the chorus gradually diminishes.



There is another chorus at dusk, which is considered quieter, though some birds - like tree sparrows and blue tits – seem to prefer to sing at this time of day.

Singing workout!

Singing is hard work, and uses hard won food reserves, so it is the fittest, best-fed males who produce the strongest, most impressive song. Females therefore choose a mate who sings best, because such a male is more likely to be good at raising chicks, to have a good territory, or to pass successful genes to their young.


In many species, once the female has been attracted, the male will sing less often. A bird that sings on and on, late into the season, is probably a lonely bachelor who has failed to attract a mate.

While most species will still be setting up breeding territories or finding a mate, early breeding species such as blackbird, collared dove and robin, may already have eggs or young chicks. These birds are taking a risk, as there is still a chance that the weather will turn. While garden thick hedges and nest boxes are important nesting spaces for breeding birds, providing supplementary food is a guaranteed way to attract them into your garden.

During the spring, energy provided by seeds and nuts may help adult birds prepare for the breeding season, whether they are defending their territory, laying eggs or feeding chicks.

On the menu

There is a wide range of bird food available, and knowing what to provide for the birds can be confusing.

- Sunflower hearts are more popular, but more expensive, than black sunflower seeds, although both are high-energy products.
- Cheaper seed mixes often have a high proportion of cereal, popular with sparrows and pigeons but higher quality mixes with lower grain content are more suitable for finches.
- High-quality peanuts in a mesh feeder can attract both woodpeckers and nuthatches, and mealworms are great for ground feeders such as robins.
- Whatever food you put out, always ensure there is drinking water available nearby, and that you reduce the risk of disease spreading at feeding stations by regularly cleaning feeders, bird tables and bird baths.

Childerley Gate: The School on Bourn Airfield

Sadly, with a few exceptions, schools are closed for the present and the focus is on home schooling. But what was schooling like for the children of Caldecote in the past? One hundred and seventy years ago there was no school in Caldecote. In 1851 the children of the village had the right to attend the endowed school at Toft. At that time most of the houses in Caldecote were situated around the church and along the southern end of what is now Main Street. That would mean a long walk either across the fields to Toft or along the route of Bourn Brook. This remained the case until the early twentieth century, although in 1892 some children are noted as having attended the school at Bourn, which would also have entailed a long walk across fields. School was not compulsory for children between the ages of 5 and 10 until after a law was passed in 1880, so it is possible that not all children attended school before then. Another law in 1893 raised the school leaving age to 11 years, but children older than 11 did not have to attend school at all and instead many were put to work. It was not until the early twentieth century that Caldecote got a school of its own.

When we, that is, Caldecote Local History Group, were putting together *The Book of Caldecote*, many of the residents to whom we spoke mentioned that they had attended Childerley Gate School, which existed between 1910 and 1940. Sadly, the school was demolished when, at the outbreak of the Second World War, the land on which it stood became Bourn Airfield, a satellite air-base for RAF Oakington. It is said that an aeroplane coming into land struck the roof of the school and the building was demolished as it had become a hazard to aircraft.

Long-term residents of Caldecote may have memories of the school, the head-master's house, the ringing of the school bell, and their recollections of the teachers, and the lessons they attended. But with exception of one photograph taken in about 1930, in which the school buildings can be glimpsed behind a group of pupils, we have no idea what the school buildings looked like.

But, hidden away in the Cambridgeshire County Council archives, there are the original architect's drawings for the entire building. We now know what Childerley Gate School looked like when it opened in 1910. And for the first time since its demolition 80 years ago, we can display these images on our Caldecote Local History Group website. Please go to caldecotelhg.co.uk/ to view the drawings in detail. Unfortunately, for contractual reasons we cannot include them here.

The drawings were signed by Mr H. H. Dunn ARIBA, the County Architect of Cambridgeshire County Council at that time. The drawings appear to have been completed in June 1909, and the copies we have were probably used by the building contractors, Clark & Sons of Cambridge.

From the drawings, we can see that the headmaster's house was a two-storey building, attached to the school, which was single storey. The school bell tower was placed on the roof over the main classrooms. The drawings show all four elevations, north, east, south and west, and plan views of the internal layout. The school had two classrooms, one for infants and one for older children, up to the age of 14. There were separate cloakrooms for boys and girls, and a block of outside toilets that must have been very cold in winter. The headmaster's house had a parlour, a living room, a scullery (kitchen) and three bedrooms on the first floor. These drawings, which are now very fragile, were beautifully executed and coloured by hand. There is a tremendous amount of detail to be seen if you look

closely. The notes and details have been added in neat handwriting that can be read clearly. They really are a work of art and we are very lucky that they have survived. (The original drawings are deposited in Cambridgeshire Archives, Ely under catalogue reference KCC7/ARCH/E3/8).



Pennies for St Michael's Church - Our Oldest Building!

With the Covid situation you may well have forgotten about this! Basically, the Church building is still standing, but as usual, needs maintaining if, after Covid, it is to be of use for current and future generations of the village.

Recently the Vicar David Newton sent a letter round explaining the Church roof was in need of some attention even though at the present time there are few services. Like other charities, no fund raising events have been possible in the last year but fortunately there were funds in the Friends fabric Account which could be fallen back on in this difficult time. These fabric funds seem to amount to about £20,000 of which, if you can believe it, the pennies have raised £2, 644.66. It seems hard to believe how much those tiny coins have made.

I also have another number of donations which have not yet been counted due to the problems of getting a group together for counting. However, as a couple of donations are a good size I am very optimistic that when we can get together to count we will reach that £2,700 mark.

You may wonder why I am bothering with this as most transactions are now with cards. However, people may still have coins they don't want at the moment - and not just pennies. If you are one of these the Church would be delighted to have any loose change/coins you are happy to get rid of for the time being. They can be brought to me at 1, Porthmore Close off Strympole Way (put in any container - jars/plastic bags) - or if we don't hear the bell simply placed near the milk crate outside the front door. I always look there. Any amount would be gratefully received. Please think of the Church roof!! (NB we are NOT Porthmore WAY!)

I do hope this will raise some more donations. The Church is the oldest building in our village and does need preserving. Any quantity of any spare coins small or large will be gratefully received. You are also able to access enclyclopaedias, directories, genealogy, online film, history, music, business resources and much more from the comfort of your home.
