

East West Rail Announcement

On Friday 26th May, after much delay, East West Rail finally announced their chosen rail route for the Oxford to Cambridge rail line.


Devastatingly for Caldecote, they have not veered from their intentions published in April 2022 during the non-statutory consultation. The selected route is Alignment 1 which goes through Cambourne (North) and then south through Highfields Caldecote. The full update can be found at https://eastwestrail.co.uk/routeupdate.



The announcement is just a line drawn on a map at this point and it won't be until later that we find out the details of exactly where it will go, who will be affected, what it will look like etc. Those of you that remember and were actively involved in the last consultation will recall talk of 12m high embankments. EWR have promised to improve on this but details at the moment are slim. Lots of questions are still up in the air about freight, diesel and the financial case. However, it is

obvious, and EWR have said so themselves, that the business case and profit/loss ratio are not as important as the strategic gains to be had from connecting Oxford and Cambridge and this project is wholeheartedly supported by the current government on that basis. Lots more house building will come with the railway to help pay for it, and to supply the demand for it in the future. This is a government policy driven project,

What Happens Next?



Stage 3 – Choosing a Preferred Route Alignment and additional infrastructure

Underway

EWR have chosen a Preferred Route Alignment between Bedford and Cambridge, and the options for additional infrastructure between Oxford to Bicester, Bletchley and Bedford.

This choice was based on feedback from two previous consultations and continuing environmental, economic and technical studies. It will be presented to the public alongside other parts of the Project, including the proposed design, in a statutory consultation (currently planned for the first half of 2024). The information from this consultation will be used to finalise the proposals for the railway. EWR will also seek the next stage of funding and approval from government.

• Stage 4 - Securing development consent

This stage involves:

- EWR Co submits an application
- o Planning Inspectorate holds an Examination
- Secretary of State for Transport makes a decision

EWR submit the proposals to the Secretary of State as part of an application for a "Development Consent Order". On his behalf, the Planning Inspectorate will carry out a public examination of the application which normally lasts up to six months. People will be able to comment on the application. The Inspectorate goes through a strict process of examination and hearings, before making a recommendation to the Secretary of State on whether the proposals should go ahead. A final decision is usually given within six months of the examination closing.

Stage 5 - Construction begins

Once EWR have complied with any initial conditions or requirements included in the Development Consent Order, the government will consider the full business case for the Project to make the final decision to proceed. Following further conversations with the public and stakeholders, EWR can start to construct the new railway.

Drop-in Events

EWR are holding a series of public drop-in events across the route to give people the opportunity to meet the team and find out more about their updated proposals. The one local to us is at the **Cambourne Belfry on 11th July, 2pm-8pm**

What Can Caldecote Do?

A village working party committee has already been set up to help gather, and respond to, the information available. The aims of this group will be to share the workload involved to analyse again the preferred route, assess the impact for the village, highlight arguments for or against with evidence and, should the railway go ahead, help detail the mitigation that would be necessary to reduce the impact as much as possible on our village. Caldecote Parish Council is also represented in meetings held directly with EWR and with other parishes along the route. This is not the end, and Caldecote will continue to fight to have our feelings and concerns heard.

The Facebook group set up previously during the previous consultation will continue to be the best place to keep informed, contribute to and follow discussions and to offer any assistance you can to the campaign to fight for the best result for Caldecote. Caldecote Parish Council



This is a busy time for the Parish Council. The end of the financial year was 31st March, and the annual meeting of the council was held on 11th May. Councillor Polly Field was reelected Chairman for 2023/2024 and Councillor Helen Cartwright was re-elected Vice-Chairman.

We are pleased that the new path around the Peace Garden has been completed allowing clean walking around the garden.

We have installed new safety fencing around the play park in the Furlong Road recreation area.

The Parish Council is currently working on a major project to update and refurbish the pavilion.

The work will include replacing the existing outside shed and toilets, the metal construction has rotted and beyond repair. This will be replaced with a new Portakabin, which will have two new changing areas, toilets, and showers, for home and away teams, the new Portakabin will be fully sustainable to meet current eco requirements.

The current storage rooms will be replaced with a new container, adding greater security for all the equipment currently stored. The current pavilion will be modernised and brought up to sustainable standards. The current disabled toilet does not meet current DDA standards and will be upgraded.

The current hot water and heating system is currently very expensive to run now that energy prices.

have hit higher levels, the insulation will be upgraded. In addition, the existing mezzanine floor cannot be accessed, this will be addressed.

After consultation with sports clubs and associations we have decided to remove the current

showers and the dividing wall between the current changing rooms will be removed and the enlarged room can then be used for larger sporting events and parties.

We are hoping all this work will be completed during the current municipal year. The works are being funded by developer contributions which are currently held by the council.

Annual Report

At the end of each municipal year, I prepare a report that gives an overview of the main achievements of the District Council, which I present to the Parish Councils at their annual meetings. Some important highlights: we are now delivering more council houses than ever before, 88 in the last year. We adopted 3 Neighbourhood Plans and have 6.2 years of housing land supply (greater than 5year minimum government target). GCP Making Connections Consultation for Bus Service Improvements

We expect some changes to the proposal based on comments received from the public. This report will go through the GCP process of consideration by the Assembly, then the Board in June 2023. East West Rail

By the time you read this, the Government should have announced its preferred route alignment for the EWR section from Bedford to Cambridge South Station. We hold our breath!

Short Term and Holiday Lets

Many properties are being turned into AirBnB and holiday lets in tourist hotspots and Greater Cambridge is no exception. Government is now consulting on a proposal to introduce planning permission for turning an existing home into a short-term let, to ensure local people are supported in areas where large numbers of holiday homes are preventing them from finding affordable housing. Anyone thinking of turning their property into holiday lets should be aware.

Four Day Week (4DW) Trial and Extension

The report of the 4DW trial has now been published and is very encouraging, showing that performance has generally been maintained or improved, and staff retention better. This means service improvement for our communities and savings for some expenditure. The trial is being extended for a further year so there's more detailed information before a final decision is made on whether to make it permanent or not. You can read the real

Water Supply Consultations

All water companies produce a Water Resources Management Plan (WRMP) every five years, and this sets out how they will ensure resilient water supplies to their customers over the next 25 years.

The Greater Cambridge area is covered by the Cambridge Water (CW) Company. Anglian Water (AW) supply area adjoins Greater Cambridge and are linked in supplying this area. Both AW and CW have published their WRMP consultation and SCDC has responded to both, emphasizing the need to ensure they continue to work closely together especially on the AW projects for long term water supply like the Fen Reservoir, and the pipeline for interim supply.

Pennies for St Michael's Church - Our Oldest Building!




Easter has been a very busy time for the Catholic parish of SJF. We have celebrated a plethora of cultures within our church, starting with St Patricks Day in mid-March.

Holy Week started with the 'Pesaha' on Maundy Thursday, this is a tradition celebrated in Kerala India, where the priest or head of the family blesses the firm rice cake that St Thomas made, this is then shared amongst the family or families and in our case many parishioners.

On Holy Saturday, we celebrated' Swieconka', a traditional Polish celebration when Easter baskets are blessed, the baskets are filled with breads, sausage, and treats representing the abundance of God's love and generosity. Sixty plus people attended this event, the Polish community were very grateful to be able to celebrate Swieconka together.

On the same day at the Vigil Mass, we lit the 'Easter Fire' a symbolic event representing Jesus as the light of the world...Alleluia, Alleluia, He is Risen! We all feel truly blessed at the sharing of different cultural traditions within our Catholic church community.

Spring Gardening

Anyone familiar with our lovely Cambridgeshire soil will know that our heavy clay can be a slurry pit in winter and bake to something like concrete in summer. It's good for roses and other carefully chosen plants. After years of adding organic material it can still be difficult.

A few years ago, we decided to take the plunge and make some raised beds. We used plastic boards from local supplier Filcris because we like the idea of using recycled materials, the boards are UV stable, won't rot, are very easy to work, and probably cheaper than timber.

We made 6 beds from the recycled plastic and 2 beds from the 200mm x 50mm timber we rescued from our earlier beds which were only 200mm deep, the new beds are 2 planks deep. We dug the soil over in the bottom of each bed, added a barrow load of pea shingle to improve drainage, then more soil conditioner (Denise's Delight from Madingley Mulch or the free material from Amey at Waterbeach) then more of our home-made compost. We finally forked it over again to mix the material up and assist the regeneration of the microbial content of the soil. We are keen advocates of making your own compost.

In general, we're very pleased with the result. We try to follow a "no dig" method so as not to disturb the soil. The advantages of raised beds are that we don't have to bend down so far (a consideration now that we're no longer spring chickens). Weeding is very easy, we just pull them out with our fingers and we get mostly good results with all the vegetables and salad items we grow.

This year, the 2 wooden beds we'd made from recycled timber finally needed replacing, so we replaced like with like. It took a little while to recover from the shock of how much 200 x 50mm pressure treated timber costs these days. We lined the inside with a double layer of heavy-duty membrane. Other people advocate the use of plastic.

We feel a little conflicted about the two approaches. On the one hand, we really like the practical utility of using recycled plastic. On the other hand, we prefer the aesthetic appeal of the timber beds. As they say, you pays your money and makes your choice.

Gardening Tips for the Summer by National Trust's expert gardeners.

Cut back plants

At this time of year, it's a good idea to trim your perennials so that they flower for longer and keep their strength and vigour.

Many gardeners like to do the 'Hampton Court' hack in July. This method involves taking the shoot of a plant in your flower border and cutting back by roughly a third.

Deadhead flowering plants

It's important to deadhead flowering plants to keep them healthy and blooming for as long as possible.

Avoid over-watering

You may not need to water as much as you think, especially if the soil is healthy and the ground is covered by plants or mulches.

Give your plants a drink if they are starting to wit but don't just water the surface of the soil as this will cause shallow rooting.

It's best to water your garden first thing in the morning or in the evening.

Limit digging during dry periods


Our gardeners warn against a lot of digging in dry weather as it damages the soil structure, increases moisture loss and disturbs plant roots.

Plant autumn bulbs

Late summer is a good time to plant autumn bulbs, including cyclamens, colchicums and dahlias.

Take cuttings for next year

Take and raise cuttings from your favourite flowering plants during the summer, so you have a plentiful supply for next year.


Your Local Family History Society

Wildlife Trust: West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update, June 2023

Thank you for those people who keep their dogs on a lead in our special woodlands in the West Cambs Hundreds area. Keeping dogs on leads is the default for our reserves, including Gamlingay Wood (and Sugley Wood), Waresley and Gransden Wood (and Brownes' Piece) Hayley Wood and Hardwick Wood. There are a few exceptions, which can be found on our website. We are looking to improve signage, but temporary signs are easily removed, and more permanent signs are expensive. In Waresley and Gransden Woods we have a new volunteer who walks the woods regularly and chats to people about the reserve and how to use it sustainably. If anyone is interested in doing something like this in Gamlingay Wood, please get in touch.

Here are some reasons why we want dogs on leads and on the paths

- The presence of a dog can disturb wildlife at the time (like basking reptiles, fledgling birds, or small mammal) and their scent can deter wildlife after they have left
- Dogs with topical flea treatments can poison water
- Dogs disturb sediment which covers leaves of oxygenating plants in water. This
 affects life at all levels (and we do love our tadpoles!)
- Dogs off a lead disturb ground or near-ground-nesting birds (like meadow pipets in Sugley Wood, skylarks in agricultural fields, willow warblers which are declining in our region, wrens, robins and blackbirds)
- Dog mess is unpleasant for people visiting and affects soil nutrient levels
- Dogs can trample plants on the woodland floor

Here are some reasons why we ask this even from the most perfectly behaved dog:

- When people see others with their dogs off the lead, they think it is ok, but not all dogs stay close to their owners
- Some people including some children, are scared of dogs, regardless of how they behave. It is reassuring for those people when a dog is on a lead.

These sites are owned by the Wildlife Trust BCN, and are managed for wildlife with permissive access for people. We want people to enjoy the woods and we want to keep them special for generations. The more we treat them with respect, the more likely it will be special for future generations.

We really appreciate those who use our sites sustainably, and those that go the extra mile to care for these woods by doing things like picking up litter and reporting issues.


