Caldecote Parish Council is currently busy working on several projects which we hope will bring better use of the village facilities.

Work is continuing the upgrading the Pavilion. The current prefabricated building has now been demolished and the building work is commencing to accommodate the new Portakabin which will contain new toilets, changing rooms and showers.

Chris Fuller, our cricket and pitch supervisor has decided to retire, we are therefore liaising with St. Giles Cricket Club, who will be taking over the running and maintenance of the cricket pitch and boundary outfield.

Members are receiving regular updates about the proposed East West Railway from Councillor Nichola Pritchard. Currently there is not much to report, we are still awaiting the date of further consultations and an update on the proposed route.

We are still concerned about the change of flight path from Luton Airport we have made representations to National Air Traffic Services (NATS).

The weekly Community Hub for senior citizens is currently open on Tuesday mornings, we are pleased to report that the contract with Cambridgeshire Acre to provide the hub has been extended for a further 2 years. If you want company, warmth, and a cup of tea/coffee you will be made most welcome.

South Cambs Magazine

Cambridge 2040

This is the Michael Gove grand plan to build 200,000 houses in the Cambridge area between now and 2040. Mr Peter Freeman (Homes England Chief Exec) whom he has selected to head the Cambridge Delivery (super)Group has started to have meetings with the main stakeholders in Greater Cambridge to understand the area better and the work that is already being done here. A Water Group has also been set up to look at the solution to the water challenge that the area faces. The Cambridge 2040 plan is going nowhere if the water issue is not resolved.

South Cambs Hall Ground Floor Project

The District Council is converting an area of the ground floor space at South Cambridgeshire Hall into an attractive space for hire for use by individuals, businesses, and community groups who are looking for "meanwhile" desk, collaborative and meeting space. There will be facilities such as standard desk and meeting room space and a podcast room. The aim is to make this space into a hive of entrepreneurial activity which has support, collaboration and idea sharing at its heart. The work is well underway, and we expect the space to be open April 2024

Visiting Support Team

The District Council offers a visiting support service to residents who are 65 years or older. It is a short-term support service providing confidential, emotional, financial and practical support and promoting independent living in the community. Referral can be through family or friends, GP or someone else in the community. They also support younger adults living in supported or sheltered housing providing assistance with managing money and health, helping tackle loneliness and social isolation, and staying safe. Cost of Living Support

South Cambridgeshire residents are being encouraged to ensure they take advantage of all the cost-of-living support they are entitled to this winter. As weather gets colder and more is spent on heating, the District Council is urging residents and organisations to make full use of assistance available. Draft Homeless Strategy Consultation

The Council is consulting on its new draft Homeless Strategy (2023-2028) from now to 5th of January 2024. A review of homelessness within the district looked at the numbers and trends relating to homelessness as well as factors affecting this. The strategy sets out how the Council plans to respond to and tackle homelessness within the district over the next five year period and

how to provide suitable housing options. The consultation documents can be found on the council website <u>https://www.scambs.gov.uk/homeless-strategy</u> where you can also give your feedback.

Four Day Week Trial

As I've stated in monthly reports, the District Council has been trialling a four-day week to try and resolve staff recruitment and retention issues. This area is very expensive to live in, and public sector pay and conditions cannot compete with the private sector. However, the Minister Lee Rowley took a dislike to the trial and continues to make over-reaching decisions instructing the trial be stopped because he "doesn't think it will work" without hearing the real facts. He has refused to accept the invitations of the Council Leader for a face-to-face meeting and issued "Government guidance" instructing councils not to take up 4DW. Furthermore, a Best Value Notice has been issued and Government now asking the Council to provide weekly report of every type of performance data and kitchen sink they could come up with. The trial results so far show performance is Council maintained, great savings is being made as council has filled 14 out of 23 hard-to-fill posts previously covered by agency staff, so slashing costs to the taxpaver by hundreds of thousands of pounds. Staff turnover has reduced by 36% and sickness levels down by a third. Staff motivation, health and wellbeing is boosted leading to fewer staff wanting to leave and greater consistency in service delivery to residents. The latest performance reports can be found on the council website for the recent Cabinet and the Staffing & Employment Meetings. The trial is continuing. South Cambs offices remains open 5 days a week, and the Contact centre is open longer hours than before the trial. The out of hours emergency response officers are available 24/7 and a new webchat service is available.

Weather Issues - Flooding advice and sandbags

Following recent heavy rains, the Council is reminding residents about the importance of being prepared for possible flooding as we go into the winter months. This is especially the case for residents whose properties have flooded before. The flooding page of SCDC website at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/flooding has a useful list of things residents can do in advance of rainfall, including signing-up for Flood Warnings, using the Government's Flood Information Service to check if a property is at risk of flooding and preparing a flood plan. It also has a list to ascertain what would need to be reported to which organisation in the event of a flood.

Tax-Free Childcare account

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) is reminding families to open a Tax-Free Childcare account to save on their yearly childcare bills. The scheme provides working families, with children up to the age of 11, or 16 if their child has a disability, up to £2,000 a year per child or £4,000 a year if their child is disabled. County Councillor News

Letter from your Councillor

Dear residents,

It's a busy time of year for the District and County Council, and I thought it might be helpful to update you on some of the work and projects going on.

The County Council recently ran a 'Quality of Life' survey involving over five thousand residents. The good news is that most of us feel happy and safe, well connected to their communities, and believe that this is a great place to raise children. However, more residents reported feeling lonely than the national averages, particularly 18-25 year olds, who were also the most likely to have struggles with their mental health. In terms of council services, Libraries and Waste Management had the highest levels of customer satisfaction, and Roads and Pavement Maintenance the lowest. We will be reflecting on these and other findings as we decide on the Council's priorities for the future.

I was delighted to see the first round of new 20mph schemes receive funding, including locally in Harlton – these new zones will help make our villages safer. A new round of funding will open in January and I hope many villages will again put forward proposals.

I know that our local bus routes are a vital lifeline for many residents, and I have been working closely with other local councillors and the Mayor's office to tackle concerns. We had a productive meeting with a representative from Whippet regarding the No. 18 service, and they have committed to improving the accuracy of the real-time displays, alongside a new website and app where you can check the progress of each individual bus. They also report that a new fleet of buses, and some successful recruitment, should reduce the number of cancellations. Please keep relaying any concerns to your local councillors so we can ensure the service improves.

Meanwhile, the District Council remains in the news as the trial of the four-day-week for staff continues. So far, the data I have seen suggests that Council has saved significant amounts of money through improved recruitment and retention, without a reduction in services nor an increase in complaints, so it seems sensible to me that the trial continues as planned, ahead of a comprehensive review in 2024. The UK Government seems to have taken an inordinate level of interest in what is, essentially, workforce planning at a small district council, but we will respond as fully as possible to their concerns.

Residents are welcome to contact me on any matter concerning them about local services. I wish you the best of health and in due course a merry Christmas!

Caldecote Village Hall, Furlong Way

The village hall provides a lovely setting and facility for village activities, events, clubs, parties, weddings, christenings, business meetings etc. It is set in its own grounds with plenty of grassed outdoor space for marquees, bouncy castles or just enjoying the fresh air, along with ample car parking. The hall is fully accessible to everyone, with separate male, female and accessible WC's and baby changing facilities. There is fully integrated PA system and hearing induction loop.

The hall also now has full fibre Wi-fi installed, and we will shortly be installing a projector / soundbar facility for presentations, showing films etc (hopefully up and running by the end November 2023)

Facilities

Large Hall 10m x 8.5 m, accommodates up to 90 people Meeting room 8m x 3.5m, accommodates up to 30 people. Fully equipped kitchen, including some everyday crockery and cutlery (excluding pots, pans and oven trays etc) and with a server's hatch to the main large hall Table and chairs included in hire charge Matching set of event crockery, cutlery, wine & water glasses for up to 90 place settings available for a small additional charge Commercial dishwasher with 4-minute wash cycle Fully licensed for music entertainment and the sale of alcohol Off road parking for up to 31 cars including 3 disable bays, and cycle rack. Free 1 hour set up and 1 hour clear up time offered – we do not clean after every hire but ask hirers to respect the facilities provided and leave the hall clean and tidy and as found. This also

hirers to respect the facilities provided and leave the hall clean and tidy and as found. This also helps us to keep hire rates to the minimum possible.

Please note the village hall organisation is a charity run entirely by unpaid volunteers for the benefit of the village and surrounding communities. Anyone who is willing to offer a small amount of their time and become a member of the hall committee will be very welcome.

Most of the current committee have been running the hall since it opened in 2001, and consider that, by now, they have done their bit and are looking to step back. Without anyone coming forward to help, the hall may have no option but to close. Please consider if you would be able to give a few hours a month to help out and run this great facility that would be a huge loss to the village. Pennies for St Michael's Church - Our Oldest Building!

It has been a good while since I was able to put an entry into the Journal regarding our penny collection for the Church. As a reminder last Christmas was very exciting as by a few pounds (approximately \pounds 3 !) we managed to reach our far distant target to collect in, by just those few pounds, the amazing sum of \pounds 3,000! Since then, even a few more small and larger bags of coins have come in and our latest total of pennies and small coins collected and counted is now \pounds 3,040.70. That means roughly an extra \pounds 37.00 in small coins and pennies have been delivered to me. It may not seem a lot of money but it all adds up. That in itself is equal to 3,700 pennies and believe me the bag was indeed heavy!

Since that count a few more pennies have still come in. Coins are less readily available now due to more people shopping online and card payments being frequently used. However, if you do have any coins that you are able still to collect and save - please do so. The Church fabric will always be grateful for them.

I must confess that due to a current hospitalised bout of Covid our last count has been delayed. However, it will be done soon and our latest figure should be in the next journal. Pennies are still coming in and the box where I keep them feels heavy! So please do keep adding to it!

Every penny goes to maintain our village's most historic building – the Church. There are no admin costs. It is all collected and banked voluntarily. Keeping our oldest building properly maintained is an ongoing task and we do need villagers support to achieve this. There is no other financial support from anywhere else other than the village.

Please do help us increase that magic total of £3040.70. If you are starting to think of Christmas and presents, please think of the Church!! Another 6,000 pennies or small coins will take us the next hundred!!!!

Gardening Tips for the Winter by National Trust's expert gardeners.

Prune your roses

Most types of roses should be pruned in January or February before the leaves start to emerge. Modern roses can be cut back hard while the older types should be pruned more gently. Always remove any dead, damaged or diseased stems.

Planting and pruning fruit trees and bushes

Bare-root trees and bushes can be planted between November and March if the soil is not frozen. You can also prune apple and pear trees, gooseberries and currant bushes. Remove dead or rubbing branches, shorten new growth a little and try to keep an open centre to the tree or bush.

Herbaceous perennials

Don't be tempted to be too tidy. Leaving some growth on your perennials will provide a winter habitat for the wildlife that uses in your garden. Some dry stems to hide in will make the winter months easier for many insects.

Look after wildlife

Leave out bird feeders and water baths or gently melt the ice on your ponds. This will allow garden birds to get a drink. A healthy garden ecosystem also needs insects so why not make a simple bug hotel with wood and sticks? Fill the gaps with hollow plant stems and pine cones to make a welcoming place for bugs to hide.

Protect outside taps

Drain outside taps and isolate them if you can. This will prevent burst pipes and a damaged tap in frosty weather. If you can't isolate your garden tap then insulate exposed pipes and fit a tap cover to protect it from the cold weather.

Protect tender plants

Move tender plants in pots to a sheltered place or cover them with fleece, hessian or straw. Keeping the roots dry will greatly increase the plant's chances of survival through winter.

Gardening Thoughts

It is often said that this is the time of year when we "put our gardens to bed," nothing happens. Well, it is a time for planting bulbs, but it is also a time for making leaf mould.



We gather our leaves and chop them up with a mower, it just helps break them down and put them in the large green bin, this is just a standard composting bin without a base. We also fill 3 nets, so the initial volume is 3 times that of the large green bin.

Gradually they naturally break down and we transfer the leaves from the nets into the green bin. It's important that the leaves are kept moist, so if we see it is drying out too much, we just put a can of water in the top, it just aids the decomposition.

Next autumn we will transfer the contents of the green bin, which after a year will be about half full, into the small black bin to finish maturing. This is just a standard dustbin with holes drilled in the side.

The following spring it will be ready to use. It will now be a sweet-smelling crumbly mixture, low in nutrients, which we use to blend in with our peat-free potting compost. A typical mixture would be 2 parts peat-free, one part grit and one part leaf mould but it depends what conditions your plant needs to thrive.

Leaf mould makes an excellent soil conditioner for out notoriously heavy Cambridgeshire clay, and it's free!

If you just want to try making leaf mould, you can fill a plastic sack with leaves, providing it has some holes in the side, and just leave it, that will work just as well.

We use bins because we make as much leaf mould as we can, as it's such wonderful stuff.

Wildlife Trust BCN West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: Dec 2023

You may not think it, but something that seems innocuous, like a muddy path, is actually quite destructive. Most of the damage to our woodland reserves happens in winter when the paths are at their most vulnerable. Over time, due to wetter winters and higher visitor numbers, paths are getting wider, and plants like oxlip, bluebells and violets, that enjoy the sheltered but sunnier areas on the edges of paths, are retreating. Please do consider walking elsewhere when paths are muddy.

If you have not visited Cambourne Nature Reserve, there are lots of paths to explore and some are surfaced. You are welcome to contact me for a recommendation of a route. In the colder months, look out for the winter migrant birds like fieldfares and redwings which feed in large flocks on hedgerow berries, and invertebrates on farmland. They are common around Cambourne.

Over the winter period I plan most of my events and activities for all ages, for the following year. Please get in touch if you have any suggestions, or would like me to come and give a talk to your group, or attend your event.

If you are interested in volunteering, please get in touch. Hardwick Wood has a regular work part that undertakes essential habitat management over the winter.
