Kids meet the Cops

On Saturday 10th February the Parish Council welcomed officers of Cambridgeshire Constabulary for a "Coffee with a Cop" at the Pavilion. Many villagers and children attended and met the officers. People had the opportunity to express concerns about the recent vandalism and lawlessness in the village. Chairman Polly Field thanked the officers for attending and listening to community concerns.

The old sports container has now been taken away, subject to the weather, we are expecting the builders to install the foundations for the new Portakabin. Once this work is completed we will start the refurbishment of the Pavilion.

The Council recently welcomed our County Councillor, Councillor Michael Atkins. He was asked about the state of the roads and footpaths in the village, members also expressed concerns about potholes, which are increasing at an alarming rate, Councillor Cartwright had forwarded a list of potholes and other issues. He promised that he would take up all of the issues with the highways department.

The Parish Council recently agreed to the 2024/2025 budget. Members proposed a 1% increase in the Parish Precept which will result in an increase of £1.08 on a typical "Band D" property.

Cost of Living Support

Home energy support

SCDC is part of the **Action on Energy** partnership which provides advice, guidance, and support on making homes more energy efficient, the aim being helping people save money on fuel bills. There are grants available for installing insulation, solar panels and heat pumps for those who qualify. Civil Parking Enforcement service

New Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) powers in South Cambridgeshire has been given to Cambridgeshire County Council following Parliamentary approval. It came into effect on 19 December 2023 and in January motorists in areas of parking demand were made aware by issuing warning notices. Penalty Charge Notices started being issued from 1 February, for fines between £50 and £70, depending on the severity of the offence. So please be careful.

South Cambs Finances

SCDC is in good financial state, contrary to some of the false/fake news that was in media in past months. The figure latched onto is the £205 million that the SCDC had to pay to the Government in March 2012 so it could keep its social housing stock and all the rent from it!! And this money, like a mortgage, is completely within the Housing Revenue Account (HRA) which is ringfenced solely for Housing. It is completely separate to the General Fund Account used for running the council. The HRA debt is serviced exclusively out of the rental income from the housing portfolio. Read it here:

BUDGET for 2024/25: Next year's budget proposes significant investment in the Council's services including recycling and waste collection service, funding for new staff to tackle fly-tipping and the expansion of the successful Zero Carbon Communities scheme. This is building on a clear track record of success and delivery, and the very sensible decisions taken over the past six years, including sound investments. The recent independent peer review, carried out by the Local Government Association, said that the council has 'enviable' finances. The council's transformation programme is a long-term process driving improvements in customer service and saving money. But cost of living means still taking tough decisions on fees, rents and council tax.

Online Checker for Home Improvement Projects

The Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service has launched a user-friendly online checker to help homeowners find out if planning permission is needed for home improvement projects such as dormer windows, fence installations, outbuildings, front porches, flue installations and more! Four Day Week Trial

The 4-day working week trial has now been in place for 12 months for desk-based staff. Savings made by not overspending the budget on agency staff have been enormous, money which is now in reserves to be

spent on services for communities across the district. The impact on staff wellbeing and attitudes has also been amazing – going the extra mile is now commonplace across the Council, with obvious benefits to services provided to residents and businesses. Also, all of the data we are currently submitting weekly to DLUHC is published on the council website.

Planning and Housing

Local authorities have a statutory duty to publish an Authority Monitoring Report (AMR) that details progress on housebuilding and how its planning policies are being implemented. The latest version published by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service for the 2022-23 year shows that jointly 2,339 dwellings delivered of which 794 were affordable houses (472 of those in South Cambridgeshire). Over 21,000 sq. meters of employments space including at Melbourn. Also 3 new neighbourhood plans were adopted. The report also outlines the factors affecting the timetable for the emerging joint local plan, mainly water supply issues which is down to Cambridge Water, transport challenges (GCP and Combined Authority) and Cambridge 2040 Gove plan. Cambridge 2040 – Gove Plan

This is the grand plan the current Government announced to build revised number **150,000+** houses in the Cambridge area between now and 2040. Note the "+plus" that Michael Gove said in his speech in November! The timeframe may now extend to 2050 as it seems the Gove plan is estimating 200,000 increase in jobs by then and a population growth nearly three times as much. Huge and scary numbers that bear no resemblance to, and so much higher than the figures that both Cambridge City & South Cambridgeshire are using for the emerging joint local plan! The Gove plan cannot even see light of day with current water and transport constraints but Gove and DLUHC are carrying on. And the Ministers are still not talking to the local councils so we don't know if it will be in addition to our numbers or included!! So much for localism.

East West Rail: This rail line is still planned to go ahead, primarily because it is seen as contributing to the transport solution for the "Silicon Valley" that the Gove Cambridge 2040 plan is planning to create in our region centred on Cambridge and surrounding (that is us). EWR say they aim to do a statutory consultation within the first half of this year. So look out.

State of District Report

This report gives a high-level overview of the key dimensions of society and economy in South Cambridgeshire giving the context for the decisions made. It uses data from a number of sources, including 2021 census and covers six areas: population, health and wellbeing, deprivation, the local economy, housing, and carbon emissions. In summary, the district population is 162,000 up by 9% from 2011. Most of the increase is older age group, and younger 15-24 year old decreasing! Life expectancy is 83 yrs for male and 85 yrs for females, higher than England average. The local economy is dominated by the services sector, contributing to over two thirds, a GVA value of £5.7billion. This is an increase of £1.1bn in the last 10 years. 
1st Caldecote Rainbows and Brownies meet every Tuesday during term time, 5.45-7.15pm at Caldecote Sports Pavilion.

Caldecote Village Hall, Furlong Way

The village hall provides a lovely setting and facility for village activities, events, clubs, parties, weddings, christenings, business meetings etc. It is set in its own grounds with plenty of grassed outdoor space for marquees, bouncy castles or just enjoying the fresh air, along with ample car parking. The hall is fully accessible to everyone, with separate male, female and accessible WC's and baby changing facilities. There is fully integrated PA system and hearing induction loop.

The hall also now has full fibre Wi-fi installed, and a wide screen projector which can be linked to a laptop for presentations, slide shows etc or direct access via Wifi to Netflix and Amazon Prime (via hirers owns accounts). Small additional charge for use of projector.

Facilities

Large Hall 10m x 8.5 m, accommodates up to 90 people Meeting room 8m x 3.5m, accommodates up to 30 people. Fully equipped kitchen, including some everyday crockery and cutlery (excluding pots, pans and oven trays etc.) and with a server's hatch to the main large hall Table and chairs included in hire charge Matching set of event crockery, cutlery, wine & water glasses for up to 90 place settings available for a small additional charge Commercial dishwasher with 4-minute wash cycle Fully licensed for music entertainment and the sale of alcohol Off road parking for up to 31 cars including 3 disable bays, and cycle rack. Free 1 hour set up and 1 hour clear up time offered – we do not clean after every hire but ask

Free 1 hour set up and 1 hour clear up time offered – we do not clean after every hire but ask hirers to respect the facilities provided and leave the hall clean and tidy and as found. This also helps us to keep hire rates to the minimum possible.

Please note the village hall organisation is a charity run entirely by unpaid volunteers for the benefit of the village and surrounding communities. Anyone who is willing to offer a small amount of their time and become a member of the hall committee will be very welcome.

Most of the current committee have been running the hall since it opened in 2001, and consider that, by now, they have done their bit and are looking to step back. Without anyone coming forward to help, the hall may have no option but to close. Please consider if you would be able to give a few hours a month to help out and run this great facility that would be a huge loss to the village. 

Have you seen this insect? Asian hornet, Vespa velutina



What is it?

A highly aggressive predator of native insects that poses a significant threat to honey bees and other pollinators. Originally from Asia, in 2004 this invasive non-native species was accidentally introduced to France where it has spread rapidly and into neighbouring countries. Since 2016 a number of sightings have been recorded in the UK.

Where might I see it?

May be seen on flowering plants, around beehives, around rotting / fermenting fruit and protein, and at street markets attracted by sweet fruit and fish stalls. Active February to November across England and Wales.

This insect stings, do not disturb an active nest.

Bees in Spring

Winter is not my time of year; too cold, too wet, too little light, no colour. For the bees inside my hives things are no different – winter is a difficult time for them. They do not hibernate as such, but during winter there are between eight and ten thousand bees in a hive hunkering down, clustering in a tight ball around their queen to keep her and each other warm.

But as the daylight hours are slowly getting a little bit longer and the sun's rays carry a bit more warmth, the bees will slowly start to venture out again in search of the first available pollen and nectar. From about 12 degrees Celsius bees will able to fly again and the offerings of hazel pollen or nectar from early flowering snowdrops or crocus are a welcome and much needed source of nectar and protein.

While early signs of Spring all sound lovely and promising, for bees it a difficult and dangerous time of year. Over the winter the bee colony will have used up most of its sugar stores; the queen is starting to lay more eggs in the spring and together with increased flying activity, the colony's need for energy is rapidly increasing. But as there is not yet a lot of forage to be found in nature, this is when a colony is most likely to die from starvation.

Anything you can do in your gardens to help bees will definitely be welcome – any early flowering plants, be it shrubs like blackthorn or bulbs like snowdrops, can all help bees to stock up their dwindling stores. Even the resolve to plant some bulbs later this year for an early show of blossom next year is worthwhile.

By the time fruit trees like cherry or apple come into flower, bee colonies will have built up their numbers to hopefully make use of these nectar sources and start to store surplus as the first honey crop of the year.



Bees will still need your help even then, particularly this year and it is all about the Asian Hornet (Vespa velutina): For many years beekeepers have anxiously been observing the situation across the Channel where the Asian Hornet has been spreading fast and has become a real threat for domestic bees. These insects are an invasive species originating from Southeast Asia, and have a voracious appetite for honey bees. While up to 2022, only the occasional Asian Hornet somehow made it over the Channel, last year 72 nests were found in the UK, mostly in the southern counties; despite the fact the all of these nests have been destroyed, it is likely that others have remained undiscovered and that the Asian Hornet will soon become established in the UK.

Therefore, if you happen to spot an Asian Hornet (see picture and description opposite), make sure you report the sighting quickly so that the necessary action can be taken swiftly in order to halt or at least slow down this species' progress in the UK.

The Early History of Hardwick Wood

The Caldecote Newsletter was a publication that preceded The Caldecote Journal, featuring local news, events and items of interest. Leafing through the edition for May 1986 I came across an item about Hardwick Wood. It was written by Joan Benfield of the Cambridgeshire and Isle of Ely Naturalist Trust which at that time was responsible for the care of the Wood. She also noted her indebtedness to Dr Oliver Rackham, a historian of the countryside with a keen interest in ancient woodlands such as Hardwick Wood.

The following is extracted from Ms Benfield's article and may be of interest to everyone who uses the Wood today.

Hardwick Wood is a 43 acre deciduous wood between the villages of Hardwick and Caldecote and in many respects it is the best-documented wood in England.

Anciently called Braidelah it originally belonged to the Bishops of Ely, presumably having been carved out of the West Cambridgeshire Wilds some time during the Anglo-Saxon period. The Domesday entry ('a grove for fences') implies coppice management, and by 1251 this practice was certainly well established. The Ely Coucher Book of that year names the wood, giving its area as 21 ½ acres. In the Hundred Rolls of 1279 the area is given as 15 acres, and in a 1356 survey of the Bishop's Lands, 20 acres. The differences in area are probably not significant, allowing for the medieval tendency to underestimate the area of woods. The Bishop's tenants had duties of carting the Wood's timber, maintaining the boundary ditch and cutting hazel rods to make hurdles. In return, they had rights to specified amounts of underwood. To supervise all this there was a professional woodward, the woodland equivalent of a gamekeeper.

Annual accounts survive for most of the years 1338 – 1495 and show that the actual area cut varied widely from year to year, though there was a gradual lengthening of the original five-year underwood rotation. Timber trees, mainly oak and ash but with some maple, were felled irregularly, sometimes in large numbers, and there is mention of the cut wood being used as wrangelons which were probably large coppice poles.

By the 16th century management of the wood was formalised and villages were interpreting their common rights more liberally. The system is recorded in great detail in a law suit of 1587, when the estate had been leased to a developer, Sir Francis Hynde of Madingley, who 'cutt down, spoyled and carried awaye the most part of the same wood there growinge'. For this he was taken before the Court of Kings Bench and successfully prosecuted by his tenants. The commoners' rights took up two thirds of the wood, the landowner holding the wood rights on the remainder, as well as rights to the timber on the whole wood. The commoners' strips were known as 'rindges', a system which appears to have been unique to Hardwick Wood.

Hardwick Wood was confiscated by Queen Elizabeth I in 1599, and passed through many private hands including those of Pembroke College. The estate accounts continued to record sales of wood and timber by a woodward on behalf of the owner, and also payment of quit rents by the commoners for the rindges. Wood sales last appear in 1662. At some later date the owner made part of Hardwick Wood into a close by grubbing out as much wood as he dared, though this subsequently reverted to woodland.

By the 19th Century the land uses and ownerships of the Wood were still very complex. Rindge rights existed until 1836 when an Enclosure Act for Hardwick Wood extinguished these and compensated their owners. The Wood was gradually replanted with oak, conifers, and elm, and although the underwood was not destroyed, the new owners clearly intended to grow timber and bark, both of which commanded unusually high prices at that time, at the expense of the underwood which had formerly been the chief product of the Wood.

By way of example of how timber from Hardwick Wood might have been sold, Caldecote Local History Group has in its archive a copy of an auction catalogue from 1873. The timber for sale was not from Hardwick Wood. The vendor was Mr Robert Huddlestone, a farmer of 13 acres, situated in the south of Caldecote, near the church. The catalogues lists the timber for sale, and beside each item handwritten notes detail the prices obtained. The total value of the sale was £172 and 18 shillings, which would be about £15,000 today.

One of our charitable aims is to enhance everyone's enjoyment and understanding of wildlife. Our events programme is quieter over the colder months, but now spring has arrived, here's a snap-shot of some things on offer over the next few months between Gamlingay, Cambourne & Comberton.

Sit and chat in nature:

These sessions are designed for those who want to enjoy nature on our reserves, alongside a sit down and a cuppa (we won't walk far!). They are running in Gamlingay Wood (21st and 25th April 10-12ish) and on Cambourne Nature Reserve (13th June and 4th July 10-12ish).

Walks for adults

My spring wildflower strolls are 2-3 mile walks around our four woodland reserves in the West Cambs 100s:

- Hayley 17th April 10am-12
- Gamlingay 20th April 10am-12
- Hardwick 24th April 6-8pm
- Waresley and Gransden Woods 27th April 8-10am

Cambourne Nature Reserve is an accessible reserve with paths suitable for wheelchairs and pushchairs. You can enjoy a not-quite dawn chorus on 5th May, and an evening summer stroll on the 4th June. There's a longer walk from Cambourne to Bourn Windmill on 22nd June, for those confident on more uneven terrain.

Millbridge Brook Meadows

I'll be celebrating the 10 year anniversary of this greenspace in Gamlingay with an adult walk focussing on common wildlife identification on 6^{th} May, and a family session on 30^{th} May.

Wilder home-school

These child-led outdoor sessions in Cambourne are for home-school families with children from ages 5-13. They happen Wednesday mornings during term-time from April to October

Wild in the Woods

These are family sessions for primary-aged children with a variety of themes on Wednesday mornings during school holidays.

Little Bugs

These pre-school sessions involve a nature walk and story with a wildlife theme. We do simple outdoor activities and talk about whatever wildlife comes up! They run Friday mornings, April- Oct.
