

The Caldecote Peace Garden has begun to evolve into a lovely place to sit.


This year has seen the placement of the raised beds and the arbor seating area. We have begun to lay out the flower beds, which have been planted with lots of bulbs and flowers.

June 2024

The Annual Parish Council meeting took place on 2nd May 2024 the following were re-elected. Councillor Polly Field – Chairman Councillor Helen Cartwright Vice-Chairman

Peace Garden: The Peace Garden at Furlong Way continues to mature, there have been further garden furniture installed, including a pergola, seats, and a miniature bridge. The council recently transferred the sum of £3,500 to the Peace Garden organisers. The money was a result of a section 106 agreement with the developers from various sites in Caldecote.

We have applied for a 20mph speed limit in Highfields Road, to enhance safety, particularly by the school. Hopefully the County Council will put us in the top of the priority list.

Work is still progressing with the Pavilion enhancements; the old metal cabin has been removed and the foundations laid for the new all-purpose Portakabin for the use of sports clubs.

We are also seeking tenders to re-surface the car park and access road, which is now far beyond repair.

The Council has also applied to Cambridgeshire CC for the installation of up to 6 Electric Vehicle Chargers as part of the government scheme to enhance charging facilities in rural areas.

East West Rail's Proposed Line Through Highfields Caldecote

Many of you will remember the consultation held in 2021 by EWR when the village first learned of the possibility that a railway would be built through the top end of the village. This was a non-statutory consultation and since then EWR have been considering all the comments and carrying out further investigations. We are now approaching the Statutory Phase and the Development Consent Order (DCO) Process, so what does this mean?

A DCO is a piece of law that, if granted, would give authority to EWR to build the new railway. The DCO process has defined stages:

1. Pre-Application (no set timescale) - CURRENT STAGE

This is the stage we are currently at, and when EWR are required to carry out a Statutory Consultation. Due to the recent announcement of the date of the General Election this consultation, originally expected in June/July will be postponed. EWR had planned a 2-stage consultation with the 2nd stage next year. It remains to be seen what will happen now and we await further news after the General Election.

- 2. Acceptance (28 days) once EWR have produced a Consultation Report explaining how they have considered the feedback gained from the consultation they will submit their application to the Planning Inspectorate. They have 28 days to accept the application assuming all necessary documents have been submitted.
- 3. Pre-Examination (approx. 3 months) EWR must publicise that their application has been accepted and ask Interested Parties to register. Interested Parties can make written submissions and speak at public hearings during the Examination stage.
- 4. Examination (6 months) The Examination Authority gathers and reviews evidence.
- 5. Decision (6 months) Within 3 months from the end of Stage 4, the Planning Inspectorate makes a recommendation to the Government whether to grant consent or not. The Secretary of State then has 3 months to decide. Though this can be extended.
- 6. Post-Decision (6 weeks) There is a 6-week period for the decision to be legally challenged i.e. a Judicial Review.

In 2021 when the village was shocked to hear the news a few residents and councillors worked hard to try and understand what was happening, and to help gather information together to help the village respond to the consultation. Since then, a working group of residents, alongside a representative of the Parish Council, have met regularly to keep up to date and to keep information flowing so that the village can stay informed.

As we approach the Statutory Consultation it was decided that the best way to feed a lot of information to the village without overwhelming anyone was to produce a series of leaflets that tackled one topic at a time. The first of these was delivered recently addressing the Economic Case for the railway.

The information on the economic case, and that used for future leaflets, is fully up to date. In fact, this was confirmed by a representative of EWR who told the group that the information in the DCO has not substantially changed from the EWR Economic & Technical Report produced last year. Of course, there will be some changes when the DCO begins and any changes to the current information will be updated and clearly communicated at the time.

There are many nuances to the arguments and more detailed evidence that just wouldn't fit into a leaflet that busy people will read. That is why we have produced a second document of evidence to support the arguments. It is all factually correct & includes the reference material from East West Rail as well as other sources. The supporting document is available on the Caldecote EWR Action Group and by request.

Please engage with the resident's group if there is anything in there you wish to discuss, or more information you would like to know.

We all agree that the economy needs to grow faster, and that Cambridge has an important part to play in doing that. Many of us also believe there is latent demand for East West travel. Just not enough latent demand to justify £8bn of investment in a railway. On the published evidence to date, and logical conclusions drawn from that, it is not proven that this railway is the solution to generate the Cambridge economic growth most people want.

Whilst we prepare for the consultation and wait to hear what EWR will be presenting, Caldecote Parish Council have also started work on an impact assessment and ways in which the impact can be mitigated should this project come to fruition. But it is vitally important that your views are given at the two consultations to come, and hopefully the leaflets will help to bring everyone up to speed with the data that is in the public domain to date.

District Councillor News



New Municipal Year 2024/25

We are in a new municipal year starting May 2024-May 2025. As usual, I prepared an annual report that I share with all ward parish councils at their annual meetings.

SCDC 50th Birthday Anniversary

South Cambs marked its 50th anniversary with a civic ceremony at South Cambs Hall in March 2024. It was created in 1974 by combining what was then Chesterton Rural District Council and South Cambridgeshire Rural District Council. Thanks to everyone who has served on and worked for the council over the years, and to our communities for your support.

South Cambs Finances

South Cambridgeshire District Council is in a strong financial position – something increasingly rare amongst local authorities. The accounts have been published as required by government and are fully up to date up to 2022/23. Now down to Auditors to do their bit, In February, we passed our budget for the 2024/25 financial year which includes a whole range of ways we're investing in improving the lives of residents.

The Council made successful commercial investments that has brought in £7million which is being used to make up the shortfall of withdrawn government funding and enable us to continue to provide services to residents. The district is still one of the lowest council tax local authorities in the country. The council tax rise was below inflation and equated to 42p per month for average Band D property. We have council tax relief offering up to 100% relief from council tax for those residents who need it most

Grants

South Cambs continues to offer grants to our communities. In 2023/24, the Community Chest grant gave £80,000, service support grants £174,000 and zero carbon £126,000 and a few others. The zero carbon is very popular, and grans of £2000-£15000 are available for projects that focus on reducing emissions and increasing community engagement on issues relating to climate change. The current 2024 scheme is open now till 2nd June 2024 and £125,000 is available. So get your application in now or check out website or email <u>zcc@Scambs.gov.uk</u> for more details.

Planning and Housing

The Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service (GCSPS) (joint service for South Cambs and Cambridge City) is fully staffed for the first time in over a decade. The 4DW has helped in bringing in more and highly qualified professionals and range of building projects is more varied than elsewhere in the country. The service continues to meet and do better than the national statutory

timescales for determining applications. Also the Policy team continue to work extremely hard to deal with the various challenges affecting the emerging joint local plan, engaging with other stakeholders and DLUHC and the Government changes to planning rules. The main challenge is water supply and the Government has established a Water Scarcity Group (WSG) to work with all partners/stakeholders to resolve this challenge, and we are engaging with the WSG. The location of the proposed Fen Reservoir is just north of Chatteris, but wont be ready till late 2030s. So short to medium term solutions are being worked on.

GCSPS has won industry awards, including for Youth Engagement and this month been shortlisted as one of 5 finalists for the prestigious Planning Awards 2024 "Local authority planning team of the year". This is testament to the positive journey and transformation the service has undergone.

Please to report that the housing land supply for the period 2024-2029 is 6.5 years which is higher than the 5-year threshold government requires of all councils.

Affordable housing is generally delivered by housing associations, often through S106 schemes especially on major sites. However, SCDC also acquires social affordable housing in significant numbers and have delivered 109 council homes over the last municipal year and we hope to acquire even more in the coming year to help bring down the housing waiting list. The Council formed a housebuilding partnership with The Hill Group through the South Cambridgeshire Investment Partnership (SCIP). SCIP now has planning permission to build new low-carbon Passivhaus principles homes in Cambourne (area opposite/next to South Cambs Hall). 40% will be affordable comprising 72 for rent and 30 for shared ownership to add to Council homes.

Cambridge Growth Company

The Gove plan is still alive but the timeframe is extended to 2050 and still based on the economic growth driven by the Life Sciences sector. Government has now set up a "Cambridge Growth Company" (CGC) as a next step toward a development corporation. The CGC is tasked with developing and delivering the government's vision for Cambridge. We don't yet know who will be on it, but at least government now realises it needs to talk to and engage with local councils and stakeholders as it can't deliver its plans just on its own!

Cambridge Wide Open Day (CWOD)

This event is happening on Wednesday 12th June 2024. It first happened last year, as an opportunity for businesses on the science parks to open their doors to local communities and other businesses to come and see what they do and understand more about the Life Sciences, Biotech and Technology sectors driving the economy. The success of it led to organisers holding it again this year. Find out more at <u>https://cambridgewideopenday.com/</u> and register your interest. I learnt a lot from last year's open day so recommend it.

East West Rail: EWR confirmed the statutory consultation for the proposed Development Consent Order (DCO) will be in two stages, the first in June 2024. EWR is still working on putting the line underground from north of the A428 and under Bourn Airfield and Caldecote. EWR also submitted a Statement of Community Consultation to the Council setting out how it intends to consult local communities about the DCO application. The Council responded with suggestions on how to improve the information EWR will provide and how the consultation itself is conducted. SCDC is in the process of forming a group of the parish councils of the villages that will be affected, to meet quarterly to listen to concerns and ensure the council can reflect community views and concerns in a coordinated way. To be clear, the DCO application is to government, not SCDC. The section from Bedford to Cambridge is now considered part of a wider rail network that Englands Economic Heartland is working on spanning far wider across East of England and northwards. https://www.englandseconomicheartland.com/

The Elephants in the Garden



Those of you who have visited Childerley Gardens in the summer may have encountered an unusual sight for Cambridge – a group of elephants enjoying the spring blossom, the summer shade, and the autumn apples– I swear we can hear them munching on the windfalls of an evening. We love them!

It was not planned for them to be here. They were a fundraising idea of The Elephant Family – a charity set up by a group of individuals who fell for the magic of the elephant. Mark Shand (the deceased brother of our Queen Camilla) being one of them. Mark had embarked on a 900-mile journey across India, with his only mode of transport being Tara, an elephant, with whom he had many adventures. From these various experiences, and this shared love of elephants, the charity was established in 2002 to safeguard the wildlife of Asia, particularly to work on projects where elephants and people can work in harmony with each other.

The initial concept was to create a herd of over 100 elephants that would travel the world. And indeed, if you were in London in 2022 you may have seen a parade of elephants in Hyde

Park and elsewhere. Our Childerley elephants were the prototypes. They were originally residents in the grounds of Castle Ashby but they had been a little neglected. So, through contacts of contacts, they arrived here in the winter of 2017 to be restored in one of the farm barns.

In return, we asked if we might borrow them for a family party in the summer of 2018.



We loved them so much that we reached out to the charity to ask if we could find a way for the elephants to earn their keep here at Childerley. We were delighted that when the charity visited, they too were enchanted in seeing these gentle giants amongst the daffodils and cow parsley. The rest is history: an agreement was reached that the elephants could stay; we would hold fundraising events to support the charity each year – teas at garden open days being one; and that those wishing to house their own elephants could seek our advice on upkeep and maintenance.

The Elephants are made of a reed from the Lantana plant which ironically is taking over the natural habitat of the Asian elephant. They were made in a village in Assam, and each is modelled on a living elephant. The largest is called Ganesh – The god of Elephants.

We take our role of custodianship very seriously. All undergo a rigorous spring clean and winter brush-down, and whilst Ganesh is too big to be moved to be wintered inside, the others are taken into a barn. Their return to the gardens in the spring is a true highlight.





We have a resident population of bats, and undoubtedly are visited by foxes, badgers and hedgehogs.

We are very keen to encourage wildlife and are working hard to increase our biodiversity. No mow May will be observed in the hope of encouraging wildlife to flourish! We will also be looking into the Eco Church awards run

by the Christian environmental organisation A Rocha, with the aim of trying to achieve the bronze award. Do keep an eye out on our website as we move forward with this exciting project!

Gardening Thoughts

We have long been organic enthusiasts, principally to reduce our exposure to herbicide and pesticide residues. We were very concerned to read recently that some 60 chemicals are in use worldwide, and whilst residue concentrations in our food may be 'safe' in isolation, there seems to be a lack of knowledge about what risks these substances may pose in combination over time. There are several court cases going on around the world over the use of Glyphosate (Roundup) which is suspected of being linked to an excess of cancer cases amongst agricultural and vineyard workers.

Pesticides and herbicides aside, a recent article in The Guardian prompted us to re-read a piece in Isabella Tree's fabulous book "Wilding" which describes the rewilding of the Knepp Estate in Sussex. In the chapter titled "Rewilding the Soil", Isabella cites several studies going back 60 or 70 years which indicate that conventionally grown fruit and vegetables are now seriously deficient in trace elements and nutrients. She quotes from a government study "The Composition of Foods" which says that during the period 1940-1991, potatoes have lost 47% of their copper, 45% of their iron and 35% of their calcium, while declines in carrots are greater still.

The same is true of tomatoes. We would have needed to eat 10 tomatoes in 1991 as we would have received from one tomato in 1940. To receive the same amount of vitamin A, we need to eat 8 oranges to get the same amount as our grandparents were getting from eating one orange. Nutrients that were not measured in the first half of the 20th century, such as magnesium, zinc and vitamins B6 and E, are likely to have declined considerably. US government figures suggest a correlation between declining magnesium levels in foods

like spinach, cabbage, tomato and lettuce. These deficiencies are thought to contribute to the underlying causes of conditions such as asthma, cardiovascular diseases and bronchitic and orthopaedic deformities.

Pesticide residues, nitrogen concentrations and toxic heavy metals like Cadmium in our foods have been linked with certain cancers and the rise in the incidence of Parkinsons disease. Compelling reasons to have a go at growing your own.

And don't forget, if you have only a tiny garden, you can still grow something in pots, or even an old banana box. Growing something if you are able is better than nothing at all.

A Very Special Day Out

In the archives of Caldecote Local History Group are copies of *The Caldecote Parish Newsletter*, a predecessor of *The Caldecote Journal*, dating from the early 1980s to the 1990s. The edition from June 1984 caught my attention because it carried an account from pupils from our village school reporting on what must have been a very exciting trip to London on 21st May 1984. The school had entered The Cambridge Evening News Local History Competition, and they won.

The task they were set was to research and write essays on the subject of 'The Men Who Made Mid-Anglia'. In their groups the children wrote about Sir Isaac Newton, Dick Turpin, Queen Etheldreda, Jack Hobbs, and Boudicca among others. It is good to see that the definition of 'men' was extended to include some notable mid-Anglian women! All the schools who entered the competition had their work judged, and Caldecote came out on top.

The prize awarded by the Cambridge Evening News was a trip to London by luxury coach to destinations chosen by the pupils. The Juniors chose the Science Museum and the Victoria and Albert Museum, and the Infants headed to the Commonwealth Institute because they were studying New Zealand culture in class. The Infants were due to give an exhibition of Maori dancing in costume at a village community event later in the year, and the displays and films that they saw at the Commonwealth Institute clearly made a big impression on them.


The Juniors. too, found much to interest them at both museums, from space exhibits and laser beams to nuclear reactors, and a captivating gallery of musical instruments. But the highlight for the Juniors was a sight-seeing taxi ride around London, taking in Harrods, Buckingham Palace, the Mall, and Piccadilly Circus. Some of the group spotted Mrs Thatcher during their tour, while others were able to meet and stroke the horses belonging to the Royal Horse Guards.

The luxury coach also impressed. It was fully equipped with TV and video, a drinks dispenser, radio, driver's sleeping compartment and onboard toilet. The children also noted that the return journey was via the M11, which had only fully opened four years earlier and shaved 15 minutes off their homeward journey.

Thanks are due to Muriel Oatham and David Merritt who wrote the original article for the Parish Newsletter. Forty years on, how many of the pupils who took part that day remember their special day out?

Wildlife Trust BCN West Cambridgeshire Hundreds Update: May 2024

Climate change is here and now, and it is significantly affecting your local nature reserve. Changes are happening faster than species can adapt. It is making the work of The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs and Northants, enhancing habitats and biodiversity and people's enjoyment and understanding of wildlife, even more challenging. The topic is huge, but here are some local impacts.

Hotter drier summers

- Wildlife is stressed, reproduction reduced, and species are more susceptible to disease.
- There is a greater risk of fire.
- Wet areas are at greater risk of drying out.

Warmer wetter winters

- The window we have to do woodland management is reduced, making it difficult and more expensive to employ contractors, and harder for staff and volunteers to complete essential tasks.
- Footpaths are becoming wider and more de-vegetated, and this is degrading the important "edge" habitat of woodland rides.
- Site closures, aiming to protect species on the edges of increasingly muddy footpaths, are more frequent and longer.

Chaotic seasons

The timing of things like migration, hibernation, reproduction, and emergence, can be linked to day length or temperature. This causes issues when the temperature is not what it should be for the time of year. Insect emergence is more flexible and often linked to temperature, but the development of reproductive organs and migration behaviour in birds is more influenced by day length.

- Chicks may hatch before their food is available.
- Butterflies may emerge before their foodplant.
- Hibernating species may wake up early and find limited food available.
- Bluebells may decline as they are less able to adapt their time of emergence to unpredictable springs. Oak and ash trees can vary their leaf burst by 6 weeks or more, but bluebells can only adjust by around 3 weeks. Over time, this may mean areas of our woodlands become too dark for bluebells to thrive, and the "edge" habitat near wide paths and open areas will become more important.
- Migrating species may pause in their journey due to cold weather, meaning their breeding season is reduced.

What are we doing?

- Sometimes closing our sites is necessary to protect fragile ecosystems under increasing pressure. The bar for closures may change as ecosystems become more fragile.
- Our landscape-scale conservation approach means we are helping the make the land in between our nature reserves more useful for species that may need to shift their range.
- We protect and manage nature reserves which store carbon in soil and vegetation, and provide safe havens for biodiversity. Across our patch we manage over 100 sites.

- We have some nationally important sites which act as significant carbon sinks (e.g. Great Fen and Strawberry Hill)
- We teach people about climate change, why it is important, and how they can reduce their impact.
- We study the effects of climate change and how they can be mitigated through our Research and Monitoring programme, and with partnerships with universities.
- We stand up for wildlife.

Please consider how you impact your local nature reserve, because nature is in trouble.

- Keep dogs on leads
- Respect site closures
- Walk elsewhere when paths are muddy
- Don't have BBQs on our sites
- Use official entrances and stick to the middle of paths
- Support the Wildlife Trust movement by becoming a member, volunteering, supporting an event, or donating.

Matching set of event crockery, cutlery, wine & water glasses for up to 90 place settings available for a small additional charge

Commercial dishwasher with 4-minute wash cycle

Fully licensed for music entertainment and the sale of alcohol

Off road parking for up to 31 cars including 3 disable bays, and cycle rack.

Free 1 hour set up and 1 hour clear up time offered – we do not clean after every hire, but ask hirers to respect the facilities provided and leave the hall as clean and tidy and as found. This also helps us to keep hire rates to the minimum possible.

Please note the village hall organisation is a charity run entirely by unpaid volunteers for the benefit of the village and surrounding communities. Following our earlier appeals a number of people have come forward to help the hall going forward, but we are always open if anyone is willing to offer a small amount of their time and become a member of the hall committee.
